Mission Work In Rhodesia

The Rev. W. A. Cotton, C.R. of St. Augustine's Mission, Penhalonga, Southern Rhodesia, "on trek" through the mission field, in a letter, June 15, from St. Michael's Mission station to his parents in this city, writes describing his work among the natives:

"I have just about completed a very strenuous forty-eight hours at Tsouza. There were ninety-three communicants—and all to be seen beforehand; eighteen new people to be examined and made catechumens; eleven infant baptisms; three marriages; nine church dues entered and offerings to receive and enter up in the books."

"And then we had a delightful trek to Mtata where I now am writing my letter by the light of an acetylene bicycle lamp, beside a fire of sticks in the hot provided for the priest. The donkeys came merrily, the ones with the packs crowding on the heels of my white riding ass. They had been well fed with corn and the road was good."

Warns Church Against Rockefeller Gifts

TORONTO, Aug. 10.—That the Rockefeller Foundation leaves its blight wherever it falls, and the Baptist church must be constantly on its guard against accepting any of its funds and becoming entangled by such acceptance, was the declaration of Rev. T. T. Shields last night at Jarvis street Baptist church. Dr. Shields said the menace from the funds of the Rockefeller Foundation, is not to be found in the money which has already been distributed, but in the funds which remain. He said that there is a persistent campaign under way to get control of the various church colleges, both in Canada and the United States, with the aim of spreading the doctrine of modernism instead of those of fundamentalism.
