THE CAR FERRY VERY HEARTILY ENDORSED.

The mass meeting in Prince of Wales College Hall on Friday evening last in endorsement of the Car Ferry project afforded a remarkable evidence of the general and hearty favor with which that great enterprise is received by the people of all ranks and conditions, and of the high hopes which it has inspired. The meeting was remarkable in other aspects as well, notably for the happy unanimity which prevailed throughout among public men of all parties and the entire absence of any note of sectionalism or opposition of any kind. It was unique among all the meetings yet held in this Province called to consider the vexed question of our transportation.

Heretofore there had been much wrangling and dispute from time to time over plans and routes and an endless variety of suggestions, which tended to confuse the issue and weakened the force of any conclusions reached by the majority. At this meeting there was no minority, no discordant note, no indication of sectional notions or preferences, but one united and hearty endorsement of the project presented by the Government of the day. The feeling of all seemed to be that the Government had re-

solved upon a great project for the liberation of Prince Edward Island, with the honest intention to carry it out speedily. The promises of Premier Borden were accepted with implicit faith, and all were content that it should be carried forward in the Government's own way, without embarrassing advice or suggestions. This is undoubtedly the wise and prudent course. The Government has the best engineering skill at its disposal and has everything to gain by making the project a success and would certainly lose prestige by failure. It must bear the full responsibility of success or failure, and for this reason should be given a free hand. The heartiest cheers of the large assemblage were given when the various speakers urged the importance of unanimity in trusting the Government to carry out effectually its own plans in its own way. The meeting was in every way a splendid one and the result cannot be but pleasing to our representatives who have so speedily won the official promise of this great improvement. It must be equally pleasing to Premier Borden and his colleagues to find their plans for our benefit so heartily endorsed.

NEW BRUNSWICK IN CLOVER.

If large public expenditures in a Province make for prosperity, New Brunswick will be metaphorically "in clover" in the years next to come. Premier Flemming recently made the statement publicly that at least \$20,000,000 would be expended in that Province in development works within the next four years. A correspondent asserts that even this large figure is below the mark. He goes on:

"The St. John Valley Railway, on which work will be begun next spring, will cost \$9,000,000. It will cost the Grand Trunk Pacific a large sum to connect with the terminals at St. John. The short line of railway to be built from Fredericton to the Queen's County coal fields will cost \$1,000,000. The works to be constructed by the federal Government at St. John East will cost nearly \$8,000,000, while nearly \$1,000,000 will be spent in the next two years at West St. John. There you have the \$20,000,000 without reference to a \$300,000 bridge at St. John, the oil field development in the Canada Iron Corporation at their mines in Gloucester County, the establishment of new industries, the investments in fruit and farm lands, and the general impetus which these extensive developments along various lines will give to industry and commerce."

Nova Scotia is also to have a large outlay of federal money in railway extensions and public works and here in Prince Edward Island a handsome sum will be paid out in connection with the Car Ferry and branch railways. Thus the East may come into its own.

The liquor traffic, but with two limitations. If three-fifths of those voting favored National Prohibition, then after four years, intoxicating liquors could have neither been manufactured, sold, nor imported into the Dominion of New Zealand.

A considerable majority, but not the required three-fifths, voted in favor of National Prohibition on these terms. Had the majority equaled three-fifths their wishes would have taken effect at the close of the year 1915. But the voting upon other proposals regarding the liquor traffic showed that a number of those who voted for the prohibition also voted for the continuance of licenses in the meantime, so that no more electoral districts were made "dry" than had before been dry.

BIG STRIKE IN BOSTON MAKES LOTS OF TROUBLE.

BOSTON, Jan. 6.—With wharves piled high with merchandise, steamers, arriving with no hands to unload freight partially empty steamers sailing and agents turning their boats towards other ports, the Longshoremen's strike for ten cents an hour increase in wages assumed a serious aspect. Twenty eight thousand men left work at midnight on Thursday and despite the efforts of officials who held several conferences with the steamship Agents and Union leaders the strike at sunset last night showed no signs of being settled. It was even intimated that it might extend to the freight handlers who take care of the cars and the cargoes of coastwise steamers.
