(Continued from Page 12) A ship to Springfield for the Illinois State Fair the Grand Circuit stables will split, some of them going to Syracuse and the balance to Indianapolis and Hamline where the Minnesota State Fair will be held.

The Ohio Short Ship Circuit has claimed dates for a summer circuit which will open at Urbana on Decoration Day. From there the route will lead to Greenville, Marion and Elyria.

The Mohawk Fair Circuit and the Rhode Island meetings which will precede it will keep the New England horses busy to the middle of October. Pascoag and Kingston will lead off. They will be followed by South Weymouth, Marshfield, Sturbridge, Greenfield, Springfield, Northampton, and Stafford Springs.

The dates claimed for the Central Fairs Circuit will keep the ball rolling in Pennsylvania from August to the middle of October. The stops in that circuit include Kutztown, Lewisport, Port Royal, Pottsville, Reading, Allentown, Bloomsburg, York and Belair in Maryland.

While they are being held the Green Mountain Circuit will get under way with meetings at Par-ton, Malone, Essex Junction, and Rutland for which each member has received a splendid entry. Morrisville also has a good entry for its early closing events.

The Kansas and Oklahoma Circuit will precede the fairs in those states. Its members include Wichita, Anthony, Winfield, and Eureka. They will be followed by Parsons, Girard, Iola, and Miami in Oklahoma and the Kansas fairs at Topeka, Hutchinson, and Dodge City.

What Are Cubs?

A WORD TO PARENTS ON CUBBING

The Junior Branch of the Boy Scouts Association.

Some people have a curious habit of dismissing a subject without giving it really fair thought at all. Not a few parents have forbidden their children to "join the Cubs" for no other reason than that they



had not troubled to find out what Cubbing actually means. Had they asked for particulars they would soon have learnt that Cubbing is a wonderful game which appeals to the heart of every healthy boy between the ages of eight and twelve.

There are some folk that get the idea that a little boy is a nuisance, who is always getting into mischief, and needs nothing more than to be fed regularly and caned occasionally in order to "make him a man."

A boy isn't all he seems to be at first sight. He isn't only a little animal with an active body and grinning face. There is something else behind all that which he is very shy about, and which he daren't show to grown-ups. And it's this inside that Cubbing tries to get at and tries to develop. It is his inner life, where he thinks and dreams, and makes plans, and uses his imagination generally. Now when he is at school he learns to use his brain and sometimes (that's if he's keen on ordinary games) his body too.

In Quebec and Ontario, but particularly in the latter province, the weather has been generally cool and clear since the first of May and land work has proceeded more rapidly. ORIGIN OF MOTHER'S DAY

The world has always endeavored to pay fitting tribute to the gallant spirit of its mothers. Men have written poems and prose in praise of such women. But until a few years ago there was no universal tribute, no united gesture made in honor of mothers. It was Miss Anna Jarvis, a Philadelphia woman, who thought of setting aside a day of reverence for mothers. Her own dearly beloved mother had died in the city of her birth and an annual memorial service was celebrated after her passing. This plan followed in many parts of the country, until now it is pretty nearly a universal celebration. The second Sunday in May is always set aside as Mothers' Day and the symbol of remembrance is a flower. This year, it is Sunday, May 14th. If the dear parent is alive, a colored flower must be worn. If she has died, a white flower indicates her absence. Carnations have always been the favorite flower for the buttonhole.

The great men of history have always been particular to emphasize the debt they owe to their mothers. Sir Wfrid Laurier, Gladstone, Lincoln, Roberts, Ruskin and Ramsay MacDonald are but a very few of those who have attributed much of their success to the early influences that shaped the foundations of character and conduct.

The early development of the will, the curbing of the hot youthful temper, the protective arms extended to shield one as a child from the "world's cruelty"—these are the lovely gestures so well remembered of mother from the book of youth. She was the living, breathing personification of God to young eyes. Her word was the child's religion, her influence laid the foundations of character. She was the potter; the child the clay.

A GOOD CITIZEN

Phillips Brooks gives the following essentials of a good citizen: Clear Conventions, with deep patient study of the government under which he lives. A Clear Conscience, as much

Lastly, I think parents will agree with me, that all the big talk about making the "World a better place," and "leagues of nations," and "reconstructions," and so on—all this can only begin to come about when we start to make things better and more cheery for the children. Let us change their drab childhood into a chapter of romance. The heart of the child is the key to reconstruction, for "A little Child shall lead them."

THE FOUR G'S

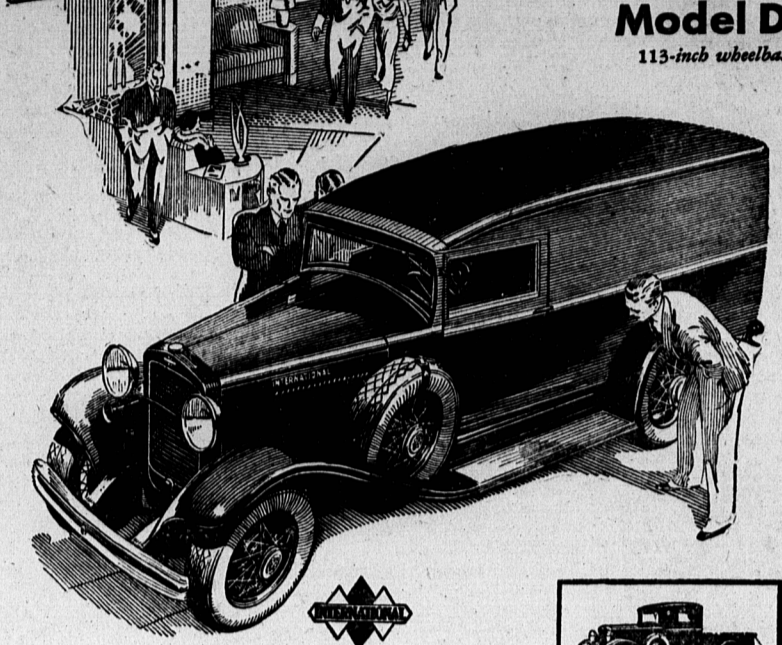
Here are four G's which I venture to say if you use throughout your life, you will be a credit to the temperance cause, yourself and your family and country.
