HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 14.—No word tonight had penetrated the fog of silence into which Willy Roddy and his two companions flew on Wednesday afternoon. Since the German flier with Christian Johansson and Fernando Costa Vlega, bound from Lisbon for New York were sighted yesterday at 1.30 e. s. t. by the liner Pennland, the whir of their motor has not been heard by land or sea. Their Junkers plane was sighted by the Pennland some 395 miles east of Halifax or 80 miles southwest of Cape Race.

Newfoundland coastal shipping had no word of the plane, and country sections of Nova Scotia and the Island Dominion, canvassed by telegraph, were without news. Capt. Henrik Laursen, of the trawler St. Outhbert, which arrived in port today from a position about 100 miles off Halifax, said he had not sighted the Junkers, nor had his wireless operator been in communication with any ship which had seen her.

WOULD REDUCE SEATS IN MAN. LEGISLATURE

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 15.—Reduction of the number of seats in the Manitoba Legislature from 55 to 35 and the application of proportional representation to the whole province with the exception of four single-member constituencies, was proposed before the special legislative committee of redistribution today by Hon. W. J. Major, Attorney General. Mr. Major said the proposal was his own and had not been discussed in the Government caucus. While considering Mr. Major's motion the committee decided to adjourn for two weeks to give the members time to think it over.

He returned to Canada with his Battalion and was demobilized in May, 1919. Since that time Major Thompson has taken an active part in the local Militia. 'Made-In-Canada Fair' Is Opened By Prem. Bennett

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 15.—With words of appreciation, encouragement and confidence, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister, this afternoon officially opened the four days "Made-in-Canada Fair." The Prime Minister spoke at a luncheon, launching the Fair, sponsored by the Canadian Women's Memorial Building National Board.

"It is indeed encouraging to see so many women taking such an interest in Canada's affairs," Premier Bennett warmly declared. "When women exemplify so great an interest in our country, in our Canadian products, I would be lacking in a sense of appreciation if I did not express my sincere thanks for their efforts, their maintenance of interest and their faith in this country." To him, the Prime Minister proceeded, it was a distinct privilege and pleasure to be present on such an occasion which marked the continued interest and leading part women were playing towards the welfare of this country.

Atlantic Fleet Is Recalled Home

Unrest In The Navy Casts Its Shadow Around Westminster—Hardship Among Lower Ratings Due To Wage Reductions, Said To Be Cause Of Dissatisfaction.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Unrest in the navy tonight cast its shadows around Westminster. The Admiralty issued a statement declaring that owing to unrest among the lower ratings over reductions in naval pay, which will be put into effect under the emergency budget, along with reductions in the other defense services, the exercises of the Atlantic Fleet have been suspended and the ships will be recalled to harbor in order that investigations of cases of alleged hardship might be made.

FREE TRADE EXPONENT FOR TARIFF

Sir John Simon, Liberal Leader, Speaks In Favor of Protective Tariff During Debate On Snowden Budget.

The Commons had passed from the economy bill, which gives the Government power to impose cuts in expenditure by Order-in-Council, to the tax-raising resolutions of Rt. Hon.
