IN MEMORIAM

MR. GEORGE B. SIMMS.

On April 6th, death claimed one of the pioneer citizens of Kensington. In the person of Mr. George B. Simms, at the age of 83 years. Mr. Simms began to show signs of failing health about two months ago and failed rapidly till the end came peacefully on April 6th. Mr. Simms led an active life. In early days he was in business with his father (the late Thomas Simms), at Kensington (then called Barret's Cross), later on he moved with his family to the United States, where he resided for a number of years, but came back again to his native place where he remained till his death. He practiced the profession of Veterinary Surgeon and always worked faithfully and with good effect for his clients. He will be much missed in the community, and the sympathy of the country roundabouts is extended to his sorrowing wife and family of two sons and two daughters, Hartie, at Kensington; Lesmie, in Montana; Mrs. W. B. George, Vancouver, B. C.; and Lottie at Kensington, besides three sisters and one brother viz.; Mrs. Stephenson, Kensington; Mrs. Delaney, Lynn, Mass and Mr. Heath Simms, Los Angeles, Cal. The pallbearers were six cousins, namely: Mrs. W. B. George, George Bearstar, James MacGougan, John MacGougan, Malcolm MacGougan, Robert MacNutt. The interment took place in the People's Cemetery.—K.

MRS CHRISTINA McDONALD.

At Monticello, on Monday, April 3rd, Mrs Christina McDonald, relict of the late Ronald H. McDonald, passed to her eternal reward, at the advanced age of 87 years.

Deceased was one of the pioneer families of this section of the province, settling with her husband—both then in the spring-time of their wedded life—on the farm which in course of time developed into one of the most comfortable and most hospitable, homesteads in that locality.

Here were exemplified the quiet unassuming virtues, devotion to home and loved ones, on which all true and abiding progress and prosperity is most securely based, the virtues of genuine Christian womanhood. In this same place, after only a brief illness, tended by all that loving care could do in the way of medical attention and religious consolation, fortified by the last rites of extreme unction, she breathed forth her soul to Him who gave it.

The funeral to St. Margaret's was largely attended. After a service by the parish priest, Rev. K. C. McPherson, her mortal remains were tenderly laid beside those of her husband, who predeceased her in 1907, there to await the day of final resurrection.

Two daughters survive, Flora and Marcella, in Boston, also three sons, James in North Haven, Joseph in Bingham, Maine, and Hugh, the obliging mail courier of Armadale B.R., settled with his wife and family on the old homestead. To all those the Guardian joins in extending sincere sympathy.

VENERABLE SCOT IS BECKONED TO BEYOND.

Joseph McKinnon, aged 75 years, passed away on March 7th in his room at the Rush building, North Bend, says a recent issue of the Record of Marshfield, Oregon.

Mr. McKinnon was born in Prince Edward Island in 1841, and his early days were spent at sea. He often gave entertaining accounts of his life at sea, and many of his experiences sounded like fiction. During the draft riots of 1863, he was on board United States transport. He was well known on Coos Bay for many years and his passing will be regretted by his many friends.

About 35 years ago Mr. McKinnon came to the coast for some time following railroading. He afterwards went to Yaquina Bay and began sea lion hunting, at which he made a good living in the summer season. After leaving Yaquina, he went to Coos Bay and was employed in the North Bend shipyard for a number of years. Last fall Mr. McKinnon met with an accident which laid him up for some time. His injuries consisted of fractured ribs and he never fully recovered from the illness which followed.

Mr. McKinnon was a member of the Coos Bay Scottish Club and was one of its most zealous members. When the last gathering was held in the Odd Fellows' Hall on the 20th of January, Mr. McKinnon was not present, and his absence was noticeable, as he had always been a prominent figure in the annual socials.

E. A. Anderson of Marshfield was a boyhood friend of Joseph McKinnon. They were sailors on one of the ships belonging to Mr. Anderson's father. Mr. Anderson said the deceased was a fine, upright man and everybody liked him wherever he was known. He was born on a farm at Goose River, on north coast of the Island, where a brother, Gadsby McKinnon, is still residing on the farm on which he was born. Messrs. Fabian and John McKinnon of Fruitvale, Cal., are cousins of the deceased.

The funeral took place from the Catholic Church, Rev. Father McDevitt, officiating, and, carrying out the last instructions, he gave his friends the body of Joseph McKinnon was laid to rest at Coos Bay.

***AN ANCIENT GUN.**—An interesting relic of the French occupation of the Island is to be seen on the ground of the late Miss Hamilton (formerly Dr. Kaye's near Georgetown in the shape of a small French cannon which was found many years ago on the south side of the Montague River, on the side of the French settlement which once occupied that part of the country. Rev. J. C. McMillan in The Early History of the Catholic Church in P. E. Island thus refers to this settlement which the English invaders destroyed during the spring of 1745. The portion of "outhside" was captured by Pepperel and Warren in June 1745 (the first siege). Some days previously, Pepperel had dispatched a detachment of men to St. John's Island with orders to destroy all the property they could find and carry off the captives. A part of this detachment landed at Three Rivers where a rich Frenchman named Roma had laid the foundation of a prosperous settlement on a tongue of land between the Montague and Brudenell Rivers. Roma's property was soon laid in ruins and himself narrowly escaped with his life. The old gun which was properly used for the defence of the settlement is five feet in length the muzzle is five inches in diameter and it bears the appearance of having been spiked in order to render it useless to the captors. Despite its great age the gun is in excellent state of preservation, and is an interesting memento of the buried long ago Dr. Kaye the original owner of the grounds on which the gun stands was the leading medical practitioner in Georgetown in the early part of the last century besides which he took an active part in politics, being a member of the government led by Col. Gray and Hon. Edward Palmer in the year 1862. The property including the dwelling house which is a splendid specimen of colonial architecture is now in the possession of Mr. J. D. Knight of Cardigan Bridge who purchased it from the late Miss Hamilton heirs.—E

I acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 27th instant, with enclosed money order for \$5.00 covering payment of the fee for analysis of a sample of "Mixed Paint" alleged to have been purchased from The T. Eaton Company Ltd., by Mr. Morris Phillips.

In reply, I beg to advise that according to the report of the Chief Analyst, the sample submitted is found to contain:—

The article is of exceedingly low value as a paint. The pigment essentially consists of Barium Sulphate and Silicate which have very little covering power. The amount of lead contained in it is very small indeed.

The statement in the advertisement that "it contains all that a first class paint should contain" is certainly incorrect and misleading.

GRAND DIVISION SONS OF TEMPERANCE

The second quarterly session of the Grand Division of P. E. I., met on Wednesday 19th inst. at North Wiltshire, with Triumph Division. Attendance was not as large as it would otherwise have been. Past G. W. P., John R. Edwards presided. The regular officers presented were J. F. Proffitt, G. S. Rev. E. S. Weeks, G. Chap.; Miss H. Edwards, G. Con.; and Alex. Cairns, G. Sent.

The session was both interesting and profitable. Considerable discussion followed the presentation of the report of the Committee on the State of the Order. This report which was adopted as follows:—

I. We appreciate the privilege of meeting with the reliable workers of Triumph Division which is now over 52 years old. We congratulate this Division on its long and useful life.

II. We recognize the difficulties our Grand Scribe has had to meet in his earnest efforts to arouse the interest and increase the efficiency of our Order in this Province during the past quarter being practically single-handed.

III. We regret the fact that our G. W. P., Rev. W. D. Wilson is unable to spend any considerable time among us as an Order in this Province while we congratulate him on his appointment as Field Secretary under the au-

thority of the Temperance Alliance of New Brunswick.

IV. It is with great satisfaction that we place on record our appreciation of the Temperance Legislation recently enacted by our Dominion Parliament, and we would urge that the most possible, be made of this advance as no doubt our Province needs to take matters more seriously if we are to retain our good name as a Prohibition Community.

V. We deplore the condition of affairs in the city of Charlottetown recently made public by the letter presented to the City Council by a notorious violator of our Prohibitory Law. This only goes to show that the enforcement of the law has been made virtually impossible in the city. As a Temperance Order we would urge that stringent measures be taken to purge the police force of all such grafters for the sake of the welfare of the Province generally, and the future good name of the city, for such revelations as have been made clearly indicate that the importance of temperance, sobriety and good citizenship need very much to be forcibly presented to our people.

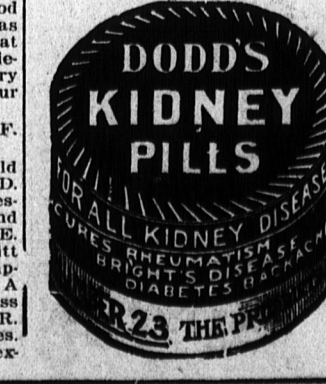
E. S. Weeks, John R. Edwards, J. F. Proffitt, Com. on State of the Order.
