Next attraction at the Prince Edward Theatre, beginning today is Hunt Stromberg's psychological drama of a beautiful woman in search of a new personality, "Dishonored Lady." The Irving Oil Company has almost completed a new building at their oil plant located on the south side of the Montague River prior to the erection of this building, the company erected a large five-story concrete building, facing directly on the lower end, has a steel-reinforced concrete foundation so as to support the heavy weight. The walls are of fire-brick construction, with the roof being of corrugated sheet asbestos. Directly to the rear, and facing the river, is the new building which is of wood construction. This building is erected on large concrete posts which are so designed to support the heavy weight of storage for which the building is being built. A full length loading platform has been constructed to allow facility in loading the trucks. Some weeks ago the whole site was filled in with clay and gravel hauled from the pit at Killmuir, thus raising the level to that of the road above. Five huge twenty-thousand gallon tanks will be put in place to the left of the main buildings early this spring. It is reported that it is possible that these tanks will be loaded by tankers from the river front. The addition of this new industry will add greatly to the development of the community, whose central location makes it an admirable point to carry business to other localities. The site of the new plant was purchased from the town of Montague some time ago, and since then preparations have been steadily proceeding apace with a view to operation next summer.
