With the Junior Royals en route to Ottawa, March 17. Back on the Memorial Cup playdown trail for the second successive year Junior Royals neared Ottawa today (Sunday) still the confident crew of pucksharers that raced so impressively to the tri-province crown.

In the best of shape the entire team hasn't a mark or injury to show after their Maritime series and Perth Wings will be faced by a squad at the peak of their game and confident of being returned the winners.

The squad have a pullman all to themselves with porter Stanley Clyke, former Acadia University student, looking after their needs and proving to be quite popular with the boys who are enjoying themselves every minute before settling down to hockey again tomorrow.

Only disappointment of the trip to date was the failure of three players, Jack Coyle, Bert Steele and Chris Gallant, together with Club President P. W. Turner, to make connections with the squad at Sackville.

This quartette, however, nearing Montreal will arrive in Ottawa tonight (Sunday) with the added experience of watching the Island breaker battle the ice of Northumberland Straits for over six hours on Saturday before docking at Tormentine.

The "rearguard" of the Royals, are having every need looked after by the club president and are journeying in pullman by the Maritime Express which left Moncton at 10:45 Saturday night.

Tales of the Royals' exploits have preceded them and all along the line from Charlottetown the team is receiving the warmest wishes wherever they run into hockey fans.

Little was heard of Perth Blue Wings while still in the Maritimes, but as we hit deeper into Quebec, varying rumors of the strength of the Ottawa and Sackville winners is heard more and more.

Opinion however, seems to be divided, some hears they are stronger and then the next hockey follower you talk to states they are not as strong as last year.

But whichever opinion proves correct, Royals aren't worrying in the least over it. They are ready for the test, and although they expect it to be a mighty stiff one, Coach Walter Lawlor is satisfied that his charges will get revenge on the squad that last year knocked them out of the running.

Reports from Ottawa also indicate that the Royals will receive plenty of vocal support for the series. Word of the Islanders' Maritime victory was hailed with delight in the capital city and former Islanders residing there, together with large numbers of New Brunswickers and Nova Scotians, will be in attendance at the games.

The list of Island fans accompanying the boys was swelled by two on Saturday when Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Beer of Charlottetown left with the "rearguard" to take in the series and follow the squad right to the end of the trail.

Mr. and Mrs. Beer are two of the team's most ardent supporters and are convinced that the Island squad will advance to the second round at the expense of the Perth team.

Just when the first game will take place is a matter of conjecture as definite word has not been heard yet whether it is Monday or Tuesday. But Monday or Tuesday, Royals will be ready. Fans at home can rest assured that in the meantime if the game takes place on Tuesday, Royals will workout at the Ottawa Auditorium.
