**Fine Display Of Needlework By Queen Mary Guild**

Yesterday afternoon members and friends of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild were invited to the beautiful home of the president, Mrs. W. Chester S. McLure, to see the yearly exhibition of work. The Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage contribution consisted of dresses for girls of all ages, underwear, boys suits, pyjamas, sweaters for boys and girls, all hand-made by the members and much valued by the Matron, Miss Beers.

The donations by the members of bonnets, trawls, underwear, bonnets, tray cloths and pillowslips for Her Majesty's Maternity Hospital in Cheshire, together with quilts and Afghanies, all for the babies and small children of sailors, soldiers and airmen, many of whom are in the Maternity Home have lost their homes and possessions.

All the above work has been accomplished since February of this year and reflects credit on the members for the willingness to keep these two branches of the work going.

Work for the Prince Edward Island Orphanage at the Queen Mary Maternity Hospital has been going on for the last 25 years—ever since the last war.

Of great interest was the large consignment of socks, sweaters, scarves, mitts and seamen's stock, all destined for the men of the Merchant Marine. Every three weeks, all the year round, a large parcel of the above mentioned goods is sent to the Central Magazine Exchange, Pickford and Black's Wharf, Halifax.

It is surprising how many of the Guild send in knitting to centres which nearly every day of the week is either receiving knitted comforts or giving out wool to enthusiastic members.

**Widely Distributed**  
Parcels sent to date are as follows: 31 for Plymouth Relief, 3 to Naval Control, Halifax, 13 to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, 24 to the Central Magazine Exchange, and 400 magazines as well as comforts, 3 to Princess Alice for the Free French, 3 to the Red Cross, 2 to Sydney, 1 to the Flying Angel Mission, 12 to individual ratings, 1 to H. M. C. S. Queen Charlotte and 78 jars of jam and jelly to H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte.

A cash donation has been given to the recent Red Cross Drive by another to the Citizens Adoption Committee of H.M.C.S. Charlotte.

These with contributions to the Greek and Russian Relief and other Red Cross campaigns, have kept the interest and enthusiasm of the members keen, as it may be stated that only once in twenty-five years has the Queen Mary Needlework Guild made a gift of wool to the public. All materials and wool is bought from Island firms and the Guild is entirely self supporting.

Also on display was a splendid contribution from Mrs. Lorenzo Evans and the members of the Quebec Branch of the Q.M.N.G. to be forwarded with the Guild's donations to overseas. Mrs. Evans who works continually for many other war charities was instrumental in forming the Charlottetown Branch and continues to take a keen interest in all its activities.

The splendid donation of children's clothes to the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage, mentioned above, contained garments for mothers and children, knitted socks, scarves and caps for service men, jackets and pillowslips for hospitals, and two beautiful dolls, with complete trousseau. All these were made with much thought and new ideas for Guild workers. 150 articles in all—a truly wonderful contribution.

**Returns To Business After 3 Years Service**

Major T.B. Rogers of Charlottetown has returned to private life and resumed his former position as manager of the W.K. Rogers Agencies which he held before the outbreak of the war.

Major Rogers returns to private life after three and one-half years of service with the Canadian Army. He was mobilized on the first of September 1939 as second-in-command of the P.E.I. Highlanders. About a week later he was sent to Dartmouth in command of two companies of the regiment and served there as Officer Commanding the Dartmouth sector of the Halifax defences.

He was transferred to an overseas posting in March 1940 and arrived in Britain in June in command of a reinforcement unit for the first battalion of a N.S.-P.E.I. unit.

He was there through the blitz and was in London for the first six days of the first big blitz. Major Rogers was with that unit until May 1941 when he went to hospital and returned to Canada in July as he was medically unfit for further service overseas.

On return to this country he was acting Commander of the Pictou Highlanders for four months. (His low category made it impossible for him to get a permanent appointment in that position.)

He was later appointed to the staff of M.D. No. 6 as the D.O.C.'s representative in Nova Scotia and acted in that capacity until yesterday.

Wine to the fact that he could not return to a field unit because of his health he sought and obtained permission to return to private life.

**P. E. I. Institute Leads Dominion Red Cross Contest**

The Uige Kinross Women's Institute have brought a signal honor to themselves as well as to this province, by winning an award in a Dominion wide contest in connection with work done for the Red Cross.

Recently they learned that they had won first place for the month of March in the "Shoulder to the Wheel Club" contest sponsored by a farm paper "The Canadian Countryman."

The first prize is a cheque for twenty-five dollars which is to be used for Red Cross work.

The prize is awarded each month for the letter telling of the best Red Cross work done by the Institutes.

In announcing the award The Canadian Countryman commented as follows:  
"Somehow it seems very fitting indeed that the \$25.00 award winners in this month of March should come from that beautiful, little sea-girted province of Canada which has always seemed synonymous with peace and plenty but which is now known to be one of the most vulnerable spots in Canada for enemy attack. We cannot but feel that if all the people of the Island are as ready and prepared, as energetic and far-seeing as are the twelve good ladies of the Uige Kinross Women's Institute of Prince Edward Island, our truly remarkable Award winners of this month, no enemy attackers would make much progress there."

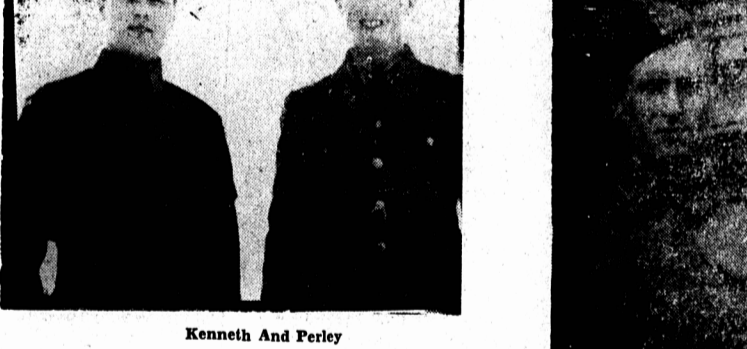

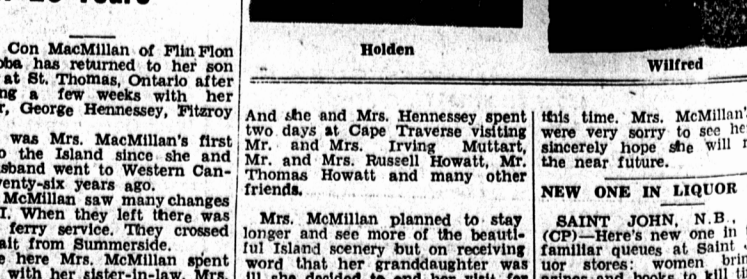
