Uruguay Expels Nazi Press Attache

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The Uruguayan government will be obliged to expel Julio Dalidoff, press attache of the German legation, as the result of an investigation revealing him as the director of subversive Nazi activities here, authorized sources said today.

BERLIN, Sept. 23.—(Tuesday)—Low-flying British planes subjected Berlin to its longest air raid, lasting almost four hours, early today, dropping bombs in mid-town despite the heaviest anti-aircraft barrage yet thrown up here.

One fire flared in the sky toward Moabit in northwest Berlin which is a region of factories. Authorities did not estimate the number of raiders, but claimed few succeeded in penetrating the city's outer defences.

London Defences Fill Skies With Bursting Shells Bombs Drop As Some Raiders Penetrate Rim Of Fire Giant Mystery Bomber Seen.

A high explosive bomb dropped in a northwest London district damaged two banks, a post office and a modern apartment building.

By LOUIS HUNTER Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Sept. 23.—(CP)—Britain today welcomed back to her shores a man whose name is a part of her air history—Air Marshal W. A. Bishop, V.C., the Canadian aviator who shot down 72 German planes in the First Great War.

The Air Marshal flew over in the transatlantic plane Clare to visit England at the request of the Air Ministry. He plans to stay for an indefinite period, devoting much of his visit to observing the 1940 crop of Canadian aviators as they play their part in beating back the Nazi air force.

By an odd coincidence, Bishop was driven up to London across the English countryside by a woman driver who had been his chauffeur once during the last war. She was Mrs. Mary Dingwall.

FINE WEATHER IN CHANNEL A SOUTHEAST ENGLISH COAST TOWN, Sept. 23.—(CP)—Fine weather prevailed in the Strait of Dover at sunset under a cloudless sky. The sea was calm. Slight mist obscured the French coast which had been clearly visible all day.

Torpedoing Has Not Altered Evacuee Plans

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Torpedoing of a British refugee liner last week with the loss of 87 children and 110 adults has not altered plans for bringing more British youngsters to American homes. Appealing for more offers of "foster homes" in the United States, Marshall Field, president of the United States committee for the care of European children, announced today that his group has arranged for four more sailings and "as far as I know, these sailings will stand."

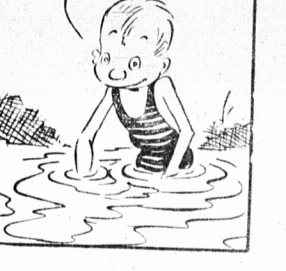
KIDNAP CASE REVIVES SEARCH FOR MURDERER
