YESTERDAY many farmers informed THE GUARDIAN that the present spell of cold weather is greatly welcomed by all who need firewood. Up to the time of the cold snap started, matters looked very serious, in fact some of the lumber men had practically given up all hope of getting their season's cut out. Now, however, the roads will be made solid and everything will be all right if the weather continues cold for a few days more.

A HALIFAX exchange of March 5th says: At Dalhousie college yesterday afternoon Rev. W. Dobson well known in P. E. Island, lectured to the students on "Philosophy and Truth." The point of his remarks was the fact that truth was proud and in itself unchanging, and the relation of truth to philosophy was that of two or three great life principles to the interpretation of them by human minds.

The following is an extract from an address delivered by Prof. Robertson before the Agricultural Congress in Fredericton on March 1st. The St. John Telegraph says: "Prof. Robertson, who was in the audience, was requested to address the meeting on pork raising. Prof. Robertson, at once consented and in opening told of the poultry shipments to England. The prices on the otherside ranged from 7 to 9d. per pound. For fattening poultry for the market it is necessary to get birds with large bodies. Plymouth Rocks and white Wyandottes were the most suitable. Several times when in St. John Prof. Robertson said he had been waited upon by merchants who said they were anxious for a pork-packing industry. The speaker did not think that the province is yet ready for such an industry, as the supply of hogs, he thought, would warrant a pork-packing industry. He had been asked what breed is the best for pork raising. Prof. Robertson didn't know, nor did he ever expect to know. It depended a good deal on the man. Pork raising is being carried on very successfully in Ontario. Shelter, treatment and food were very important features in pork raising. Hogs grow with comparatively a bare skin, and want of shelter from winds is necessary. The effect of the wind on a hog when eating will cause constipation. A pig will never thrive in a wet sleeping place. The floor should be sloped towards the trough and should be wooden covered with earth. A dark place is bad for hogs. A boar which thrives after it is weaned is the best pig to breed from. It is a good scheme to give a pig a sod to chew every other day in winter. It is important not to wean a pig too abruptly. Pigs should never be weaned until they are at least six weeks old. It is a good thing to pasture pigs in the spring. A mixture of rye and oats makes good food for pigs, and should be soaked with water. Raw potatoes are no good as feed, but potatoes give good results when cooked. Turnips and mangels are better pig feed than potatoes. The Yorkshires and the Tamworths, or either one crossed with the Berkshires, make the best bacon pigs. This concluded Prof. Robertson's address.
