HALIFAX LABOR DAY RACES
PROVE A BIG DRAWING CARD

Island Horses Make a Splendid Showing, Major S, The Yank and British Ginger Getting the Big End of the Purses in Their Classes—Peter Stratton Wins Free-for-all. Large Attendance

HALIFAX, Sept. 6.—Eighteen heats, the majority of which were featured by whipping drives through the stretch, were required to determine winners in the four races on the card at the Exhibition Track on Labor Day.

Seldom has there been a one day's race meeting which provided greater thrills for the rail birds in Halifax. Col. Dan MacKinnon, well known Prince Edward Island horseman was the big winner of the afternoon, cleaning up in the 2.40 trot and pace with British Ginger, after five heats and turning in a five heat victory with The Yank in the 2.25 trot and pace. Peter Stratton, the Moncton entry, won the free-for-all while Major S, another P. E. I. entry captured the 2.20 trot and pace, after five gruelling heats.

Upwards of 4,000 people witnessed the races, the crowd being the largest that has attended a race meeting in Halifax in some years. There was one disagreeable and disappointing feature of yesterday's races, and the management is deserving of censure for its failure to bring the free-for-all horses on the track at an earlier hour. It was after 6 o'clock when the first heat of the feature race on the card was called and hundreds of people, weary of the long wait for this event, had gone to their homes for the evening meal. Why this race was not placed second or third on the card, and thus been carried out at a time when the people, many of whom had been attracted by this event, could have had an opportunity to witness this race, is something that baffles the writer.

After Vera Grattan had won the first heat of the free-for-all in 2.15, the race quite handily. It really looked as though the Moncton paper could have won that first heat but the Stratton gelding wasn't pushed and the Halifax mare landed at the wire.

Island Horses Win

After Plate Glass had won the first and second heats of the 2.20 class, Hood being called upon to use the "bat" through the stretch to nose out Hector, with the veteran Tom Holmes driving, Major S, capped the three neat heats. The Island pacer had, too much luck for the others in the three last heats and he was never in any great danger, except in the third when Plate Glass and Major S had a thrilling battle to the wire, Hector, the favorite in this event, failed to win a heat although Homes was a contender at a stages of the race.

Col. MacKinnon's big trotter, The Yank had a great battle with Seldom C., another member of the Merriam Stables, of Parrsboro, but the son of Orlian Axworthy, once he straightened away was the class of the field. In the first heat British Ginger and Dixie Merque, both from MacKinnon stables, collared at the first turn, the Dixie Merque horse crashing into The Yank's sulky. Both horses were allowed to start in the second heat, owing to this unavoidable accident.

Veteran Driver

British Ginger was forced to go five heats to annex the 2.40 Trot and Pace Harry B., of Merriam Stables, winning the first two heats in whipping drives through the stretch. Holmes one of the veterans of turf, displayed his uncanny skill in these two heats and on a driver of his rare ability could have landed the pacer in front. But the little trotter by The British Soldier was too strong in the latter stages of the race and once he got in front in the third, fourth and fifth heats, stayed there to win the race.

Frank J. Power acted as starter, and performed in his usual acceptable manner, while the judges proved very efficient and capable officials.
