Rescue Ship Puts out for Greek Freighter

HALIFAX, Nov. 28—(CP)—A rescue vessel has put out from St. John's, Nfld., for the Greek freighter *Eugene Cambanis*, reported in trouble 125 miles southeast of Newfoundland, according to wireless messages picked up here today.

There was no indication when the ship was expected to reach the Cambanis, which has been sending distress signals for two days after boiler cooling left her helpless in a storm. Last night, the British freighter *Uria* reported she had reached the Greek's side and was standing by.

The Cambanis' engine room at that time was flooded, her foremast was down and part of her cargo had been washed overboard as she wallowed in the heavy seas.

THE GOLLIWOG LADY

For the past two years Mrs. A. F. Boyce, an elderly woman of Remuera Auckland, N. Z., has been almost entirely bed ridden, but in that time she has made hundreds of golliwog dolls, which she gives away to children in orphanages and in remote country districts.

Altogether she has made about 700 golliwogs during the past four years. She uses old black woolen stockings for the heads and bodies of the golliwogs, most of the stockings being sent to her by the girls of the local grammar school.

The children who pass her home always wave their greetings to this busy old lady, whom they see sewing away at her bedroom window. They call her the Golliwog Lady, and she is known by this name to hundreds of children who have received her golliwogs.

When the last mail left New Zealand old Mrs. Boyce was busily making up a dozen special golliwogs to be sent to the boys' camp on Makongai Island, in the Fiji Group, where hundreds of unfortunate lepers from the Pacific islands have to be isolated from the rest of the world.

Finland's President Resigns

HELSINKI, Finland, Nov. 28—(AP)—Kjell Kallio, Finland's peasant president, resigned today because of falling health and most of his countrymen believed tonight that either Premier Risto Rytö or Field Marshal Baron Carl Gustaf Mannerheim would succeed him.

Kallio sent his resignation to Parliament, which was expected to pass it quickly empowering the electoral college which elected him in 1937 to name some one to fill the remainder of his six-year term, ending March, 1943.

Police use tear Gas in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 28—(AP)—Police used tear gas bombs tonight to break up a crowd of about 500 persons who surrounded and stoned the United States Embassy.

The crowd shouted "viva Almazan—down with Wallace!" The demonstration occurred as Vice President elect Henry A. Wallace of the United States arrived to attend the inauguration Sunday of Gen. Manuel Avila Camacho, administration candidate who defeated Gen. Juan Andreu Almazan in the presidential election of last July 7.

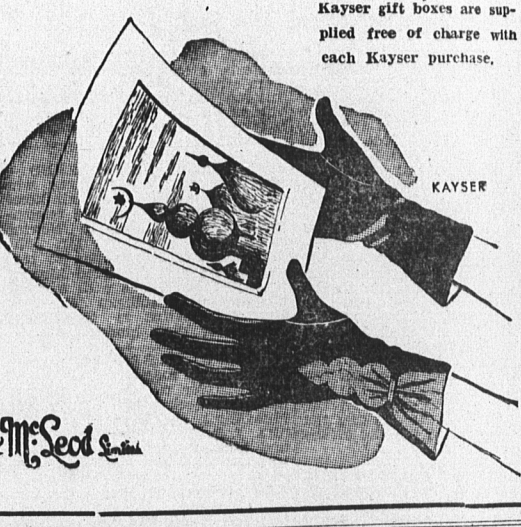
