-LECTURE AT O'LEARY.-On Monday evening, April 9th, Rev. H. G. Mellick gave a lecture here in Orange Hall under the auspices and in the interests of the Red Cross Society. His subject was "Canada." He gave statistics and illustrated by a map the wonderful interest the resources and beauties of Canada. The humorous stories and accounts of adventures he wove into the lecture kept the audience in the highest of spirits. In concluding he emphasized the fact that Canada has become more conspicuous in the eyes of the world than ever before. We have entered into world relationships and have become world citizens in a fuller sense than ever, we were in the past. We must now rise to the new situation and bear our part in the world's progress. We must appreciate our inheritance and strive to produce a high type of manhood and womanhood. After the lecture several citizens spoke appreciatively of it and a vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer, Rev. Mr. Murray occupied the chair.-Com.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. M. H. COUGHLAN

It is with a sense of deep regret that the Guardian today is called upon to chronicle the death of another valued and highly esteemed son of Prince Edward Island in the person of Mr. Michael Harrington Coughlan. His strict representative for King's County of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Mr. Coughlan's death occurred at Montague on Friday morning after an illness of about ten days of typhoid fever. On Thursday morning the Department of Agriculture received the sad intelligence that no hope was entertained for him and on the following day the news was received that he had passed away at 7 o'clock that morning. Deceased was a native of Hope River, a section of this Island which has produced many very bright and intelligent men. Mr. Coughlan was about forty years of age. He was educated at Prince of Wales College and after graduating from that institution, spent a number of years teaching towards his native province. He afterwards left for Western Canada where he homesteaded his profession of school teaching. Upon his return to P. E. Island he resumed teaching here and after the death of his father he devoted some time to farming at Hope River. He later attended Agricultural College putting in two years at Truro and two at Guelph. He entered upon his present position with the P. E. I. Government in May of last year and was a zealous and devoted worker who will be greatly missed. The body was brought to Charlottetown from Montague by train on Saturday forenoon and left by the afternoon train for his late home in Hope River. The funeral took place on Easter Sunday a large number of friends paying their last tribute of respect to one who was generally esteemed by all.

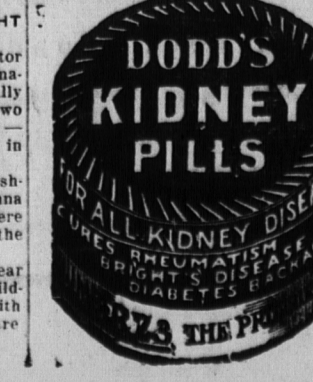
