ANNUAL MEETING

Y. M. C. A. Held Last Night.

MR. G. F. MARSHALL

And Mr. A. W. Robb Present—Another Effort Being Made to Redeem Building.

The annual meeting of the Charlotte-town Y. M. C. Association was held last night.

As announced Mr. Fraser Marshall, Maritime Secretary, and Mr. A. W. Robb, were present.

The President, Mr. J. D. Seaman, reported orally and referred at length to the discouraging aspects of the work. He thought that if the work was to go on it was absolutely necessary that a general secretary be employed.

Rev. Robt. F. Whiston, as chairman of dovtional committee, stated that he had endeavored to hold evangelical meetings, but owing to the lack of attendance the meetings were discontinued.

Mr. Thos. May reported a falling off in the attendance at the reading room.

The disposing of the Y. M. C. A. was then taken up. The borrow wing of \$1800 additional to the present mortgage to put the building in order was suggested and discussed at length.

Mr. Seaman said that if the additional loan was made it would mean that the interest would be \$250 instead of \$200 a show. The principal is overdue and the mortgagee wants the mortgage because the repairs are not being made to the building.

Mr. Cundall thought that if the Association was a sure thing some person might be found to loan the money.

Mr. Fraser Marshall being called upon, asked how much better the Association would be off if the building was sold before the Maritime Committee and it was decided to advise the retaining of the building. It is the first one erected in British North America and in this particular part to see the work stop in this particular of the globe when churches and the branches of the Y. M. C. A. throughout the world are making rapid strides toward the promotion of Christ's Kingdom.

At the meeting of the Maritime Committee there were men who were willing to loan a sufficient amount if it could not be raised in Charlottetown. The advice given to the young men of the city was to hold the fort. There is certainly great work for the Association to do in the city of Charlottetown, and in consequence of that work he would be sorry to see the building go for the paltry sum of \$3,000.

After raising amount a secretary should be secured. In fact he would be in favor of putting the secretary in the institution as it is and letting him work it up. He thought the trouble in Charlottetown was that the members of the Association did not see eye to eye. If all would unite there is certainly no power that can resist the church uniting in the benefiting of the young men through Jesus Christ. The Maritime Committee were willing to do anything. Three gentlemen were appointed to come but owing to unforeseen circumstances they could not come and Mr. A. W. Robb and himself had come to the Province. Mr. Robb will stay a month if it is necessary to do so to place the institution on a sound footing.

Mr. Cundall said that the money can be raised in Charlottetown or not.

Rev. R. F. Whiston moved, seconded by Mr. J. T. McKenzie that a committee be appointed to secure a loan of \$5,000 at five per cent, to be applied to the clearing off of the present indebtedness and to improve the building. The work of committee to be done at once. Upon motion Messrs W. C. Turner, J. T. McKenzie, J. D. Seaman were appointed a committee.

After the passing of the accounts the Association adjourned until called by the chair.
