FURTHER DAMAGE.—The central part of the Island was visited by a heavy downpour of rain commencing Sunday at noon and continuing throughout that day and night and on Monday accompanied by a fierce gale of wind rising to a regular hurricane making the elements rather disagreeable for sometime. The tide on Monday was the highest seen in East River for a long time so high that it was over Mr. Stewart bridge to the depth of about two feet and also came right up to the platform of Russel Clark's store at Hayden's wharf. A little oyster fishing village of East River quite a number of boats went adrift one of them being carried right up on the wharf, the receding tide left it. The rest were distributed along the opposite shore and driven far inland.—S.

BOARD OF TRADE.—A meeting of the council of the Board of Trade was held yesterday morning to consider the question of the handling of freights this autumn in the event of the Empress or Northumberland or either of them being withdrawn before the close of navigation. Mr. Owen, representing the Steam Navigation Company and Messrs. McLean and Nicholson were present and the matter was discussed at some length but no action was taken pending the receipt of further information. It is understood that the new car ferry steamer is being fitted up for the handling of freight in the ordinary way in the coming winter as of course there is no possibility of the Car Ferry terminals being sufficiently advanced this year to permit of the loading of filled cars.

NEW HOTEL AT POINT DU CHENE.—A new hotel was formally opened on Monday evening, Sept. 27, when persons who arrived on the afternoon train from St. John, N. B., found out that the Empress was unable to make her usual trip. Every hotel was tried for accommodation, but very few were accommodated, the result was the remainder became the unexpected guests of the I. C. R. R., who kindly furnished them with a heated car, which was very acceptable and was formally named "The Hotel De Hoho." Special mention must be made of the strenuous but successful efforts of "Jim" the freight handler who rushed hither and thither in an effort to locate them for the night. The "Hotel" was a day coach, but by a little manipulation of the seats, they were able to make up eight beds (3) The party spent a rather pleasant evening with games, and were paid a friendly visit during the evening by Conductor J. Mr. McDonald being the first to discover the fire the cracking of the burning wood having awakened him, he immediately rushed upstairs where three small children were sleeping and got them out only in time to see the roof crash in after him. THE EMERPER NICHOLAS CONGRATULATES THE ALLIES ON SUCCESS
PARIS, Sept. 28.—Emperor Nicholas today telegraphed to President Poincaré from the general headquarters of the Russian army his congratulations on the French success in the Champagne district, as follows:
"On learning the news of the great success won by the glorious French army, I take the occasion to address to you as well as to your valiant army, my warmest felicitations and most sincere wishes for the future unalterable prosperity of France."
The French president replied:
"I thank your Majesty for the felicitations addressed to our armies on the occasion of the fine success they have just won with the co-operation of their allies over the common enemy. I beg your Majesty to accept my warmest compliments for the magnificent valor of which the Russian troops daily give example and which compels the admiration of the entire world."

HEAVY ARTILLERY WILL BE CHANGED TO SIEGE BATTERIES
HALIFAX, Sept. 28.—Word has been received at headquarters that No. 1 Heavy Battery of artillery, commanded by Col. F. Minden Cole, now mobilized at Halifax and No. 2 Heavy Battery, mobilized at Charlottetown, com-

manded by Colonel Peake, have been changed to siege batteries. The heavy batteries have an establishment of 125 men each. The siege batteries are ordered to recruit up to 218 men each, all ranks. The former use guns that can be moved with comparative ease on the field, but the siege batteries use howitzer and guns that are moved more slowly.

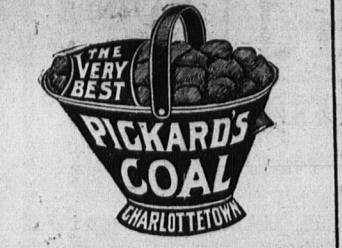

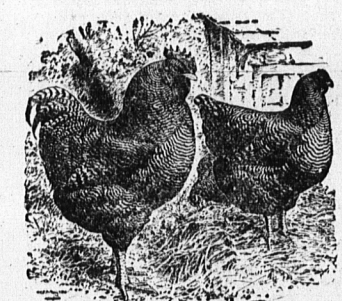
