Successful Year for P.E.I. Egg and Poultry Ass'n

the reverse side of the slip used by the managers in making their reports to members.

Freight Rates on Car Lots of Live Poultry.

WHEREAS the shipping of live poultry in car lots is a new industry in this Province,

AND WHEREAS with proper encouragement it promises to grow into a large business, profitable both to the poultry producer and to the railways,

AND WHEREAS car lot rates on live poultry are very much higher than car lot rates on other classes of live stock, such as lambs and hogs,

AND WHEREAS car lot of live poultry can be handled as cheaply and as easily, if not more so, than other classes of live stock, as poultry do not have to be removed from the car between shipping point and destination, but are fed and watered by an attendant at shipper's expense,

BE IT RESOLVED that we, the P.E.I. Co-operative Egg and Poultry Association of Prince Edward Island, apply to the Board of Railway Commissioners for an order and direction that freight rates on live poultry prevailing and allowed under the present tariff of freight rates in Canada on live poultry, be reduced from the present amounts therefor, and made the same as prevailing rates for live stock, and that the Secretary of the Association be asked to forward this application to the Secretary of the Board of Railway Commissioners, Ottawa.

A Prescribed Audit of Books of Co-operative Agricultural Co's.

WHEREAS in the past many Co-operative Agricultural Companies have not been successful through failure of said Companies to maintain an efficient system of business bookkeeping and to issue periodically properly audited statements of profit and loss,

AND WHEREAS the Directors of such Companies are not interested financially to such an extent as to be in a position to give the matter the attention which it requires,

AND WHEREAS such Companies are more of the nature of public utilities or public service organizations by virtue of the large membership entered,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, be respectfully requested to introduce into the Federal Parliament, legislation which would specify the nature of the business statements which such Companies must give to their Directors periodically and provide from time to time for an official audit or inspection of the books of such Companies.

Imported Eggs.

WHEREAS eggs imported into Canada for domestic consumption are now permitted to come into Canada without any inspection or supervision as to quality whatsoever, including inspection at port of entry by Canadian inspectors, according to the Canadian standard,

AND WHEREAS experience has shown that the quality of imported eggs is frequently quite inferior to the Canadian product and has a decidedly adverse effect upon domestic demand,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, be respectfully requested to have the Egg Regulations under the Live Stock and Live Stock Products Act amended to include eggs imported for domestic consumption, such amendments to include the following three points:

1. That imported eggs be distributed to the retail trade in original packages or in packages marked with markings similar to those required on original packages.

2. That all cases of imported eggs be marked by the distributor with the name of the grade in accordance with Canadian legal standards, the Canadian Standards that the quality of eggs imported into Canada for domestic consumption, in such as would make a desirable product to further egg consumption in Canada.

This proof to be submitted in such form as is ordinarily required by the Customs Department.

3. That all cases of imported eggs be marked by the distributor with the name of the grade in accordance with Canadian legal standards, the Canadian Standards that the quality of eggs imported into Canada for domestic consumption, in such as would make a desirable product to further egg consumption in Canada.

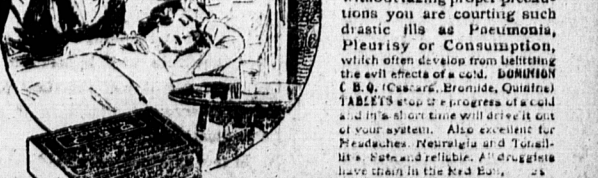
