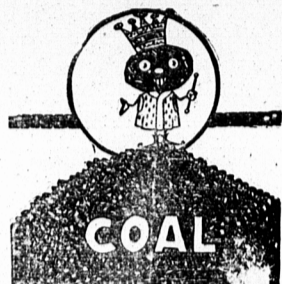

MODERN CELLS REPLACE VATICAN DUNGEONS

Medieval dungeons of the Vatican have been replaced by the smallest and most modern prison in the world. The prison consists of only two cells, to be used for the detention of Vatican prisoners. It looks on to a courtyard, and is fitted with shower baths, hospital and even a covered walk, suggested by the Pope, so that prisoners could take exercise in the rain without getting wet.

There are no inmates for the prison yet. No one has been incarcerated in the Vatican prison for a year.
