



MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

At Sydney, Nova Scotia, and with in St. Andrew's Church Hall there, on Thursday, October the ninth, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met at the call of the Moderator of Synod and was constituted with prayer. There were present: Messrs. David Wright, Moderator pro tempore, T. F. Fullerton, A. D. McIntosh, J. H. McHattie, Geo. Millar, J. M. McLeod, A. J. W. Back, J. W. McKenzie, R. P. Murray, John Murray, H. J. Fraser, John Sterling, A. J. McNeill, J. C. Martin, A. Craise, ministers. John McDonald, Allan McInnis, A. J. McPherson, Lieut.-Gov. Rogers, John A. Lawson, D. McDonald and Malcolm McLeod, elders.

The clerk was instructed to certify Messrs. Waldron A. McQuarrie and Wilfred A. McLeod to the Faculty of the Presbyterian College, Halifax. Mr. J. S. McKay was appointed ordained missionary at Richmond Bay East for one year, his appointment to date from the first day of September last.

The following arrangements were made for the ordination of Mr. McKay in the church at Lot 16—date and hour to be fixed by Mr. H. J. Fraser, interim moderator of that session—Mr. Alex. Ferguson to preach, Dr. Fullerton to address the missionary and Mr. H. J. Fraser the people. Serving of edict was left in the hands of Mr. Fraser. It was agreed to apply to the Home Mission Board, on behalf of the congregation of Richmond Bay East, for a grant of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for one year be-

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gaining the first day of September last.

Mr. A. Craise reported on his work at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, which report was received and adopted and ordered to be transmitted to the Secretary of the Home Mission Board.

Mr. A. J. McNeill reported that he moderated in a call at Caledonia on the twenty-ninth day of September last, that the call came out unanimously in favor of Mr. S. D. McPhee, Avonmore, Ontario, that it was signed by one hundred and forty four (144) communicants and one hundred and fifty-three (153) adherents, and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) stipend (the first quarter's salary to be paid in advance) with use of manse and glebe, and a yearly vacation of five weeks. The conduct of the moderator was approved.

Mr. A. J. McPherson, commissioner from Caledonia, testified to the unanimity of the people in this matter and their earnest desire to secure Mr. McPhee as their pastor. On motion, the call was sustained as a regular gospel call, and the clerk was instructed to forward the same to the clerk of the Presbytery of Glengarry. Mr. C. A. Ferguson, Vanleek Hill, Ontario, was appointed to represent the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island and the congregation calling before the Presbytery of Glengarry in prosecuting the call. Dr. Fullerton, in appreciative terms, called the attention of the court to the forward movement on the part of the congregations of Strathalbyn and Caledonia in offering a stipend of one thousand dollars; and also to the promise of the latter to pay the first quarter in advance.

Mr. Geo. Millar reported that he moderated in a call at Montrose on the fifteenth day of September last that the call came out heartily in favor of Mr. M. J. McPherson, Harvey, New Brunswick, that it was signed by two hundred and fifteen (215) communicants and one hundred and sixteen (116) adherents, and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) stipend with use of manse and glebe and an annual vacation of four weeks. On motion, the call was sustained as a regular gospel call, and the clerk was instructed to forward the same to the clerk of the Presbytery of St. John. Mr. J. H. A. Anderson was appointed to represent the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island before the Presbytery of St. John in prosecuting this call.

Mr. H. J. Fraser laid before Presbytery a scheme for the visitation of all the congregations within the bounds in the interests of Social Service and Evangelism. It was moved by Dr. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. J. C. Martin, and carried, that this scheme be generally endorsed, that Mr. Fraser be asked to communicate with the first named on each committee suggested, and that the whole budget be associated with this scheme.

Mr. John Murray was appointed to supply the congregation of New London, etc., for the remainder of the month of October instant. It was decided, on motion, that in accordance with the recommendation of Synod to consider all the schemes of the church a conference be held accordingly at the next quarterly meeting of the Presbytery on November the fourth, beginning at two o'clock in the afternoon.

The clerk was instructed to convey the sympathy of the Presbytery to Mr. W. H. Spencer, who had been called away from the meetings of Synod to attend the funeral of his brother.

Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the moderator and clerk of which public intimation was made, and this adjournment was closed with the benediction.
