indicated today that legislation would be introduced. The Glasgow members wanted particulars. The members had better await the bill, she replied. She declined to go any further. So the question hour passed, its tone indicative of some sharp challenging to come.

Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, led the House in the absence of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, now on his way home from the United States and Canada. As the Chancellor entered with his halting step, Labor cheered vigorously. When Hon. Sir William Jowitt, Attorney General, was introduced, Labor cheers were renewed. They broke out again a few moments later as J. H. Moses, Labor member, who had successfully withstood an election protest in Plymouth, entered and took a seat. Moses smilingly turned up his right thumb, while striding towards the Government gangway.

Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin roused a warm cheer from the Conservatives when he rose to ask the business of the House. Rt. Hon. Mr. Snowden gave the program. The Government hoped to pass the Widows, Orphans and Old Age Pensions Bill by the end of November, proposed to proceed with the Unemployment Insurance Bill, and also with legislation concerning the coal industry, with a view to passing it before Christmas, and hoped to make progress with other measures fore-shadowed in the King's speech in June, including the Factories Bill and other measures regulating hours of industrial employment, as well as the amendment to the Trades Disputes Act.

Booth Attracts Much Attention

The booth set up at the Fox Show by the Experimental Fox Ranch illustrates a few of the problems met with in the husbandry of foxes. Several pamphlets dealing with the nutrition and care of foxes and muskrats are available for distribution to the general public. Besides these there are specimens of the common parasite worms of foxes on display for examination with the unaided eye and with the microscope.

These parasites are the ascariid, hookworm, lung worm and bladder worm, and methods of diagnosing and determining the presence of these worms in both living and dead foxes are explained at the booth.

The common lungworm is the most serious parasite that the fox rancher has to deal with. This worm can be controlled by keeping foxes on board floors during the summer months. This is largely due to the fact that the board floor can be readily cleaned of fox droppings and disinfected with little expense when compared with similar operations on ground-bottomed pens. The practice of separating pups from the vixens as early as five weeks of age and placing the pups on board floors until the following winter sets in is proving very satisfactory in preventing the pups from becoming seriously infested with lungworms even when the parents are suffering from this disease. Moreover the use of the board floor during the summer months lessens the extent of the infestations from the hookworm and bladder worm. Parasites of the latter round worm that every rancher readily recognizes, can be removed with the usual method of pilling.

Information on other phases of fox husbandry can be obtained at the booth which will continue in operation to the close of the fox show.
