British Poultry Commissioner For World's Congress

MR. PERCY A. FRANCIS, M. B. E. HAS HAD WIDE EXPERIENCE IN ENGLAND, IRELAND AND SCOTLAND AND IS A RECOGNIZED LEADER IN THE INDUSTRY.



One of the most important Empire figures at a World's Poultry Congress of 1927 will be Mr. Percy A. Francis, Poultry Commissioner in the British Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. A native of Wiltshire, England, Mr. Francis from 1901 till 1909 was Poultry Inspector to the Antrim county council. From 1909 till 1914 he was poultry and dairying inspector under the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction in Ireland. In the latter year he entered the service on the Board of Agriculture for Scotland, in which position he remained until 1920, when he received his present appointment.

Mr. Francis is a member of the Council of the International Association of Poultry Inspectors and Investigators, which body is the organizer of World's Poultry Congresses, the third of which is to be held in Ottawa from July 27th to August 4th of this year. During the Great War Mr. Francis represented the Board of Agriculture for Scotland on numerous departmental committees in London, for which service he was awarded the Order of Member of the British Empire.

As the representative of His Gracious Majesty, our King, in the Province of Prince Edward Island, and as a member of the Honorary National Campaign Committee of the Canadian Red Cross Society, I feel I must appeal to you for your generous support from all classes and creeds in this Province.

All, I am satisfied, are fully informed in regard to the noble work that has been, and still is, being done by this Society, which was founded in 1886.

The organization was a voluntary auxiliary to the Department of National Defence in matters of health, and as a voluntary auxiliary to the official authorities, Dominion, Provincial and Municipal.

In time of peace or war, its purpose was to carry on and assist in the work for the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering among the people.

The achievements of the Canadian Red Cross Society during the late war are matters of history.

After the war, in addition to its continuing care for the ex-soldier, the Society was called upon to carry on a comprehensive peace programme in accordance with the terms of the Covenant of the League of Nations. In fulfilling these tasks, which have involved an expenditure of over seven million dollars since the war, the Society has not made any national appeal for financial support. The funds it had in hand, the contributions received, the interest on its investments have enabled it to render a series of practical services of great value to the people of Canada.

But the Red Cross Treasury is now exhausted; and in order that the Society may still carry on its worthy and beneficial efforts to improve our national health and welfare, the support of all public spirited citizens is invited.

Therefore, on behalf of the Canadian Red Cross Society, I earnestly hope and believe that the effort now being made for the collection of means to meet the demands upon the Society, will be crowned with generous success.

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Minister Of Interior Visits Island

Hon. Charles R. Stewart, of Ottawa, Minister of the Interior and Superintendent of Indian Affairs, paid an unofficial visit to Charlottetown on Saturday. He was accompanied by Mrs. Stewart, Dr. D. C. Scott, Assistant Superintendent of Indian Affairs, and Mr. Ford, Pr. Secy.

Hon. Mr. Stewart and party reached Charlottetown on the late evening train, and remained here until 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when they left directly for Quebec.

This is the first visit of Hon. Mr. Stewart and party to the province. Fortunately they came here on a rare June day, and naturally see the Island under fairly favourable conditions.

Before coming here, Hon. Mr. Stewart visited Sydney, Moncton, Halifax, the Annapolis Valley, Digby, St. John, and other points in the Maritimes. Although seeding is somewhat backward, and this is true of the rest of Canada, they found the people in an optimistic mood, and that on the whole they were well satisfied with the legislation implementing the Duncan Report. It was pointed out to the Minister that much benefit should follow from the legislation, especially the reduction in railway rates.

Speaking of conditions in Western Canada, Hon. Mr. Stewart said that the agricultural prospects are exceptionally bright. Although the farmers have had to contend with the late spring that they are on the whole still hopeful of good crops, as there has been an abundance of moisture and all that is needed now is warmth to give vigorous growth.

Hon. Mr. Stewart and party motored Saturday afternoon to Bordentown, where they took the Car Ferry enroute to their destination.
