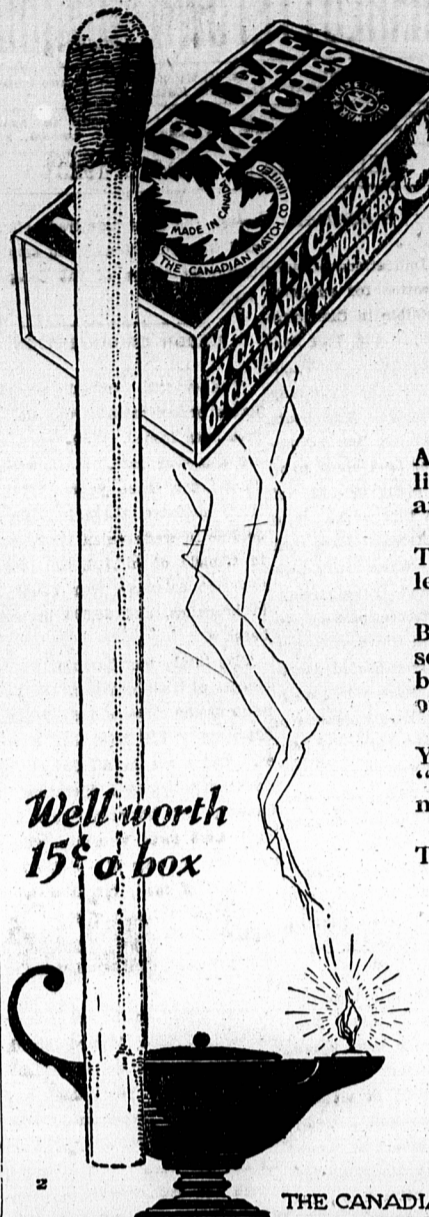

Legislative Lapses

Government House Property Neglected—One Jail For The Province Suggested—Reduction of The Legislature

(By W. L. COTTON)

That little was done, and much left undone, by the Provincial Legislature in the session of this year, will be admitted by Liberals and Conservatives. True, it was an electioneering session. Yet something might have been said and done in the course of seven weeks respecting Government House and the property connected with it. The Governor General will visit our Province and its capital in the "good old summer time," and there will, probably, be thousands of summer tourists making note of the beauties and attractions of this "Gem of the Northern Sea." What a spectacle will meet the eyes of all in the tenanted and neglected Government House, so beautifully situated and in the dilapidated broken down fences and untrimmed trees that border the property close to the city, the Province and the Powers that be, Government House and property will, inevitably—unless cared for in the meantime—neutralize in great measure any favorable effect our visitors may obtain respecting the people who live here and the men they elect to do their business. The well-kept lawns and tidy premises of citizens, the cultivated fields and growing crops of farmers, the magnificent undulating landscapes, which cover the countryside, are apt to be forgotten, and the neglected condition of Government House property only to be borne in mind and talked about, when our visitors return to their homes. A good first impression, the strong impression, ought, if possible, to be given not the Governor General and his entourage only, but every visitor from Canada and the United States, so assuring a continuance of the summer tourists. Visit. Yet nothing whatever was said or done in the session regarding the improvement of this fine public property. If but a little attention had been given it and a little thought bestowed upon it an arrangement might have been arrived at and such improvements made as would render it presentable. Perhaps, even yet, the fund to meet "contingencies" may be drawn upon, perhaps the City Council might be induced to give some help, or private citizens might lend a hand in the work of tearing down the disgraceful fences, trimming the trees and smoothing the rough dust of the membership of both Provincial Legislature and Provincial government.
