#### THE SCHOOLS REPORT.

The voluminous report on the public schools of the Province is largely statistical as usual, and indicates otherwise that matters are going on much as they have been during the years last past with some features of improvement.

The total expenditure for education last year was \$170,327, a fairly creditable amount for a small Province. The feature that is not creditable in this connection is that \$123,898 was contributed by the Government and only 946,429 by the school districts. Still the district contributions were larger than ever before, which is a hopeful symptom.

But a strong and efficient system of education can never be built up on the present basis. There is far too much looking to the Government and Sir William Macdonald to do everything and pay for everything in the matter of education.

No doubt manual training is a good thing and school consolidation is a good thing but consolidation is not the experimental stage. It has been successful at Hillsboro, with the munificent support of Sir William Macdonald. Hereafter it remains to be seen what the six districts will do.

As for pupils enrolled throughout the Province the number is the smallest in thirty years past. The percentage of attendance is two points below that of the previous year. There are 25 vacant schools—much the largest number with a single exception in ten years past.

The school system calls for radical changes, obviously in the method of support, the training of teachers, the uniting and redistribution of school districts, the increase of teachers' pay and the institution of a pension, or superannuation plan.

#### A CLEAN ELECTION.

It is gratifying to learn from reliable sources that the efforts to carry on an honest and clean election were fairly successful in the recent election in New Brunswick. It is usually the defeated party that complains most loudly of corrupt practices when the struggle is over. In this case we have the testimony of Editor McKinnon of the St. John Star, who is personally and favorably known to many in this Province, and who fought a stout battle for the defeated Government. The Star says:

"The election throughout the Province was creditable to New Brunswick. It is reasonable to suppose that the Moral Reform movement has had an important effect, but this could scarcely have been possible unless the campaign against corruption had been supported by the wishes of the people. There have been several incidents in the fight, perhaps due to personal blunders rather than to party policy, which took on a rather dubious appearance. But speaking generally the election was an unusually clean one. Little money was spent for other than legitimate expenses, and only in a few scattered districts was there evidence of liquor. This is certainly a step in the right direction."

MR. HAZEN, PREMIER ELECT.

John Douglas Hazen, B.A., B.C.L. the leader of the victorious party in the recent elections in New Brunswick.

wick and shortly to be Premier of that Province, was born in Oromocto, Sunbury County in 1860. He had his collegiate education at the University of New Brunswick, afterwards studied law and was called to the bar in 1883. In early life he lived and practised his profession in Fredericton, where he became first an Alderman and afterwards Mayor of that city.

In 1890 he removed to St. John, and in the following year was elected to the House of Commons for the City and County as a Conservative. He served with credit, but was defeated at the general election of 1896 by 191 votes. He then devoted himself to his profession till 1899 when he was elected to the Legislature for his native County of Sunbury which he has since represented.

Mr. Hazen is personally a man of distinguished appearance, above the average height, and looks a strong man. He is an Episcopalian in creed. He possesses more than ordinary ability as a speaker and is capable of oratory. His manner in speaking is calm, dignified, courteous and persuasive, seldom if ever, becoming declamatory. His personal and political record is clean. Among the nine Premiers of Provinces he will stand easily in the first division.

#### IN THE POLITICAL FIELD.

The Liberal Government of the Dominion under Sir Wilfrid Laurier was formed in 1896. At that time it had the active co-operation and support of the provincial Government of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba, an unbroken chain from the Atlantic to the Rocky Mountains. It afterwards gained the support of the Government of British Columbia, and federal and local Liberal parties were in the ascendancy from ocean to ocean in 1900.

Manitoba became Conservative in 1900, British Columbia in 1903; Ontario fell away to the Conservatives in 1905; Manitoba in 1907 and now New Brunswick in 1908. Only Nova Scotia, Quebec, Prince Edward Island and the two new Provinces created in the Northwest in 1905 now remain in the Liberal column. The last provincial elections were held in the several Provinces as follows: Ontario, Jan. 18, 1905. Quebec, Nov. 25, 1904.

Nova Scotia, June 20, 1906.  
New Brunswick, March 3, 1908.  
Prince Edward Island, Dec. 7, 1904.  
Saskatchewan, Dec. 13, 1905.  
Manitoba, March 7, 1907.

The last Dominion election was held in November 3, 1904. It will be quite possible to hold another session after the present one within the five years term. The next provincial elections coming due this year or in 1909 are those of Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Ontario in the order named.
