BRITISH AND U.S. PAIR IN SEMI-FINALS

(C. P.-A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2.—Fred Perry of England and Jack Crawford of Australia, generally regarded the greatest tennis players of the British Empire, and the two young Americans, Frank Shields and Sidney Wood, earned the semi-final brackets today in the all-England championship. The results were: Perry defeated George Lott of the United States 6-4, 2-6, 7-5, 10-8. Crawford defeated Lester Stoefen, United States 7-5, 2-6, 7-5, 6-0. Shield defeated Henry "Bunny" Austin, England, 4-6, 2-6, 7-5, 6-3, 7-5. Wood defeated Vernon Kirby, South Africa, 6-1, 6-4, 3-6, 6-0. On Wednesday Perry will duel Wood while Crawford meets shields. With one exception it is the same quartette which squared off in the semi-finals of the U. S. championships at Forest Hills, N. Y., a year ago. Wood replacing Stoefen, Perry and Crawford advanced to the finals on that occasion with Perry ultimately defeating the Australian for the title. Today's matches, played under a pitiless sun before packed stands, all were hard-fought. A disputed line decision at a crucial point in the Perry-Lott match caused a degree of bad feeling. After the first two sets had been divided Lott was leading the British Davis Cup ace 5-2 in games in the third set. Lott claimed Perry knocked the game point at least six inches over the baseline but the linesman ruled otherwise and gave the point to the Briton. From went on to win that set, then rallied in the fourth to sweep five straight points and the match after the American had raced into a 5-2 lead. Shields made a grand uphill fight against Austin after dropping the first two sets. The slim Englishman weakened in the latter stages of the match, much as Stoefen did against Crawford, while Shields steadily gained better control of his backhand. Wood had an easy assignment in disposing of the South African internationalist. The set he dropped was more because of his own lantness than any great improvement in the play of his left-handed opponent. The women will hold the centre of the stage tomorrow in quarter-finals play where the United States still has its two star performers, Helen Hull Jacobs and Sarah Paley. Miss Jacobs, the American champion, will meet Cilli Aussem, the little German girl who is making a fine comeback this year after two years of illness. Miss Paley will meet Mme. Rene Mathieu, the veteran French No. 1. Margaret (Peggy) Scriven, England's ranking player, meets Joan Hartigan, the Australian champion and Mile. Lolette Payot of Switzerland, plays Dorothy Round to England, finalist last year.

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Leads U. S. Lady Track Team In Win

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, July 2.—A little colored lady named Lyde Pickett from Chicago, carrying the track tradition of the negro into women's sports, led a powerful Highland Park Athletic Club team to sweeping victory today in Toronto's centennial track and field games before a crowd of 12,000. The Chicago group collected four victories in seven open events, two going to the slender Lyde who broke one Canadian record and helped set up another. Her most impressive performance was in the running broad jump where she made only one jump. It measured 18 feet, 1 1/2 inches, breaking the old mark by four inches. Miss Pickett also captured the 60-metre dash in 7.2 seconds, finishing a yard in front of Doris Anderson, a teammate. Annette Rogers, United States national girl sprint champion, won the 100 metres in 11.1 seconds with Mary Terwilliger of Chicago second. Miss Pickett finished second to Roxie Atkins, Toronto star, in the 10 metres hurdles. Late in the day she came back to run on the triumphant, Highland Park 440-yard relay team which broke the Canadian record when they won in 2:05.2.
