James McDougall the congregation from Pine Hill College where he has been successful as a student and he also served the above congregation for two summers where he is held in high esteem which is proof by the very hearty call extended him.

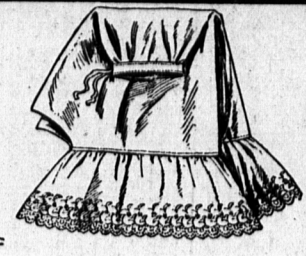
