THE GRAND DIVISION IN SESSION

Encouraging Reports From Different Divisions

A STRONG RESOLUTION

Passed In Commendation of the Work Being Done by Prosecutor Jenkins.

THE Grand Division S. O. T. opened its first quarterly session for 1903 in the hall of Aurora Division, Sealetown, on Wednesday, Jan. 28th, at 11 a. m., with the G. W. P. presiding. Officers present at session were: G. W. P.—S. F. Hodgson. G. W. A.—Annie E. Moore. G. Scribe—W. E. Edwards. G. Treas.—D. N. McKay. G. Cond.—Wellington Haslam. P. G. W. P.—John R. Edwards. The following were appointed pro tem G. Chap.—J. T. Mellish. G. Division declared open for business. Visiting members obligated and vouched for.

Sessional committees were appointed as follows: Credentials—W. E. Edwards, A. S. Wright, David Arbing. State of Order—J. J. Chappelle, J. R. Edwards, J. T. Mellish. Finance—Walter Burke, Fred Bertram, David Arbing. The credential committee submitted its report which was on motion adopted with leave to supplement.

The G. W. P. read his report which was delegated to the committee on State of the Order.

The reports of the G. Scribe and G. S. by E. W. were next presented and given to the committees on finance and state of the order.

Encouraging verbal reports were received from Bro. Burke of Mayflower, Guthrie of Prince Edward, A. S. Wright, Aurora, and Bertram of Carnegie. Grand Division adjourned to meet at 2 30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

G. Division ready for business at 2 45 minutes of forenoon session read and adopted.

G. Treas. read his report. It was received and handed to the Com. on Finance. It showed considerable financial progress since last session of G. D.

S. F. Tarbush, D. N. McKay, and Miss Annie Moore were appointed a Com. to cooperate with local Com., to provide program for the public meeting in the evening.

The report of the Com. on State of the Order was received read and with slight amendments passed clause by clause and then adopted as a whole.

The Finance Com submitted its reports which was on motion adopted. Bro J. Anderson moved and A. S. Wright seconded the following strong resolution commending the work of Prosecutor Jenkins.

"The Grand Division S O T of Prince Edward Island in regular session assembled doth hereby put on record its appreciation of the effort now being made to properly enforce the Prohibition Act in the city of Charlottetown.

We are deeply sensible to the importance of this effort as it effects not only the city but the whole province. We regret to admit that the failure of enforcement in the past added strength to the power of the liquor trade, not in the city alone but throughout the entire Island, and tended to discourage the efforts to all our temperance people. We sincerely trust that all the enemies of the liquor traffic, who can in any way second the efforts of Prosecutor Jenkins will do so and since we have such an energetic efficient and tireless a prosecutor at work let us, as temperance people show consistency with our professions by helping to have a better enforcement of the O. T. Act in our country districts. Local Prohibition is now on trial as a reality and not withstanding the money limitations to powers of enforcement we must reckon on such legislation being judged by results of this trial. Let us all then do our duty."

This resolution was unanimously carried in a standing vote. On motion resolved that the G. W. P. be asked to permit his report to be published. It will be printed separate from this account.

P. G. W. P. J. R. Edwards was appointed organizer for this Grand Division.

A hearty vote of thanks was extended to the good people of Sealetown for the royal way they had entertained the Grand Division.

NOTES.

The members of Port Hill and Heather divisions were very highly spoken of in the report of the Grand Scribe for the manner in which they had carried on their respective divisions in the face of so many obstacles. Steady progress has marked the work

of the order during the past three months and the outlook is very encouraging. One very pleasing thing in connection with this session was the unanimity of opinion with regard to the good work of Prosecutor Jenkins and the determination to stand by him.—GRAND SCRIBE.
