**Helpful Hints And Recipes**

Waffles—2 eggs, 1 3/4 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, a small lump butter, 1-2 yeast cake dissolved in 1-3 cup of warm water, 1 1/2 cups scalded milk. Add sugar salt and butter to milk and when lukewarm add dissolved yeast and flour. Let stand in moderate temperature over night and in morning beat eggs separately and add to above. Then beat well. Cook in waffle iron or gem tins.

Tea Rolls—4 cups scalded milk, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 yeast cake dissolved in half a cup of lukewarm water. Pour scalded milk over butter, salt and sugar. When lukewarm add two cups flour and dissolved yeast, let stand over night. In morning add flour to knead. Allow to rise until double bulk, then form into long narrow rolls and place in a well greased pan, brushing each roll with melted butter, allow to rise until about doubled in bulk, then bake for 25 minutes in a quick oven.

Cream Pea Soup—One can peas cooked very soft rub through a sieve and add enough water to make one pint, salt and pepper to taste. Heat one pint milk in double boiler, thicken with flour rubbed in cold milk, add to hot milk, cook about 10 minutes and add butter about size of an egg, stir well and add hot pea liquid, strain and serve hot with salted wafers.

Cyster Soup—1 1/2 pints water, 1 pint milk, 3 crackers rolled fine, a little salt, a lump of butter, let come to a boil and add oysters, let boil 10 minutes and serve.

Fruit cake—Three eggs, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup butter, 1 cup milk, 1 cup sour milk, 1 teaspoon mixed spices, four cups flour, 3 cups raisins, 1 1/2 cups currants, a little lemon or citron peel.

Layer cake—Three eggs, 3-4 cup sugar, 1-2 tablespoon butter, three tablespoons milk, two teaspoons baking powder, 1 1/2 cups flour. Mix butter and sugar together before adding other ingredients.

Ginger cookies—1 cup sugar, 1/2 lard, 1 mollaese, 1 sour milk, 1 tablespoon ginger, 1 tablespoon soda. Flour to roll out. Bake in quick oven.

Sugar cookies—2 1/2 cups sugar, 1 cup lard, 2 eggs, 1 cup sour milk or cream, 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in milk. Flour to make a soft dough. Bake in quick oven.

If vegetables become withered place in cold water for about half an hour before preparing. If badly withered add a teaspoonful of lemon juice or vinegar to the water.

Amend pad in the kitchen or pantry is a time and labor saver.

A little orris root tied in a muslin bag, and placed in the water in which handkerchiefs are locked will impart to them a delightful odor of violets.

Try this if you have chilblains—Rub into a lump of butter as much fine salt as it will hold. Then setting before a fire rub the salted butter thoroughly into the chilblains.

Hens—Give your hens plenty of pure cold water. About seventy-four percent of an egg is water. Keep the hen house clean, feed plenty of green feed, such as alfalfa, turnips, clover, cabbage, etc., until the grass comes. Don't feed all one kind of grain. Variety is good for hens as well as people.

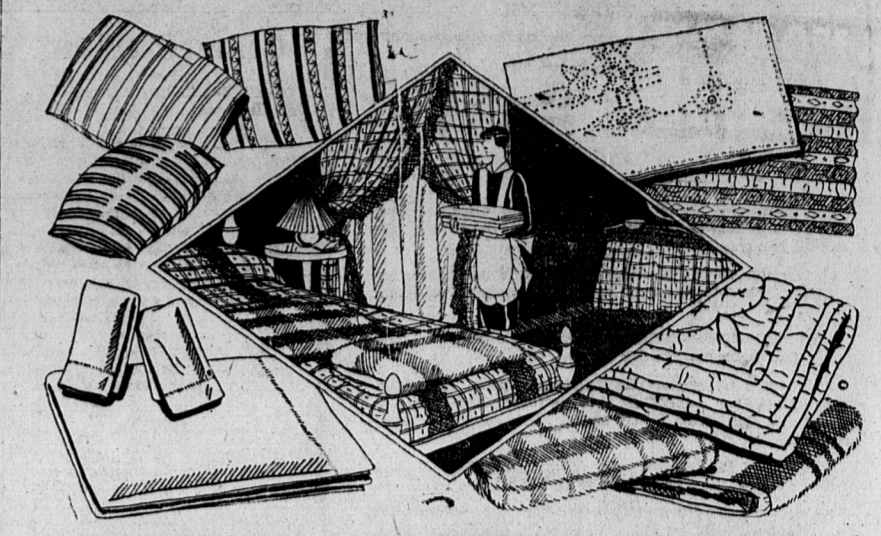
Poverty to Riches For Her

BOSTON, March 23.—Carrying the necessary papers, Mrs. Anna Griffiths of 602 Massachusetts Avenue, (formerly of Canada) has left for Hamilton, Ont., where she expects her trip will result in the acquisition of an inheritance of \$175,075, the amount left her children by her, mother-in-law, whose son, George Griffiths, deserted the Hub woman fully six years ago, leaving her and her two daughters penniless.

Assisting Mrs. Griffiths in her attempt to step into poverty to comfortable living are Gordon D. Boynton and Wendell Gordon, formerly of P. E. Island, who were attracted to the case by Mrs. Griffiths' dire need. Volunteering their services, these attorneys now feel their fight that has covered several months is practically won. Both Boynton and Gordon plan to leave Eastern this week for Hamilton and John Mrs. Griffiths who was sent there by them.

The story behind Mrs. Griffiths' struggle to provide a living for her two young daughters and herself is an appealing one. A half dozen years ago she, with her daughters, stepped off the train in Boston where she had come from Riches to N. Y. Relatives were expected to meet the Griffiths failed to appear. Having already been deserted by her husband, Mrs. Griffiths was forced to take up quarters in the Chardon Street Home.

thits, whom he had also deserted, died. For a long time no trace could be found of any of the dead woman's relatives.

changed many are domestic servants, forty are married and in happy homes, two are teachers, one a stenographer, one a superintendent of nurses attendants in the hospital where she received her own training, two others in training for the nursing profession. When it is remembered that all these were headed for vicious and criminal lives, and taken from homes of delinquency, where they had no fighting chance, you must conclude that this Home is doing a really great work in fulfillment of our Lords utterance, "Inasmuch as ye have done it to one of these my brethren ye have done it unto Me."

The second part of Social service work treated was the problem of the feeble minded. A survey made in Nova Scotia by a Royal Commission last year revealed the most startling conditions as well as the increasing menace of mental defectives. To meet these conditions Legislation has been brought down to implement the recommendations of the Commission.

Bill No. 64 provides for special classes for mental defectives in any school where fifteen or more of such are present.

Bill 174 provides for the establishment of a Nova Scotia training home for custodial cases. The Government has also appointed a Provincial Psychiatrist who will take charge of the work among the feeble minded and scholarship for teacher training to care for those unfortunate have also been founded.
