The campaign in King's for the Repeal of the Scott Act goes on apace. There was a large and enthusiastic meeting on Wednesday night at Murray River. Inspector Jenkins and Rev. Messrs Campbell and Chipman spoke for Prohibition and Dr. Barnes, who came to oppose the act or what he thought was the act, remained to praise it and promise his support, on hearing Mr. Jenkins' explanations of it. Murray River is sold for Prohibition. Indeed, the only matter of speculation is the size of the majority and as it cannot be too big and as everybody's duty is to increase it all he can it is to be hoped that every man will go to the polls on the 10th. Mr. Jenkins questioned by Dr. Barnes as to the superiority of the Prohibition Act over the Scott Act, said that it had many advantages but to him its strongest points were the right of search and the fact that it is a local act and can be made just what the people would have it. The specious argument that the ballot being marked "Against the Act" was against temperance, as the traffic tried to make it appear in Prince, is now knocked out completely. Let the well disposed portions of the community mark against the Act not to adversely affect temperance but to bring in a better act—an act up-to-date in its provisions and furnishing machinery likely to stamp-out the evils of the liquor traffic completely.
