Yanks To Get Tough On Relief Shipments

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 — (AP) — Will Clayton, under-secretary of state, told Congress today that the United States intends to slap a "Made-in-America" label on future foreign relief and that shipments will be under terms so tough that some countries may refuse them.

Clayton testified before the House of Representatives' foreign affairs committee on a proposed \$350,000,000 relief program to be limited to Austria, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Poland and China.

The intention, he said, is to let the people of foreign lands know where their bread and butter is coming from—an assurance designed to meet criticism that they were kept in the dark on the United States U.N.R.R.A. aid.

Committee members had pressed for assurance that countries "under Russian domination" would be required to distribute the American bought relief without discrimination and under open scrutiny of the American press.

In a related field, chairman Arthur Vandenberg (Rep.-Mich.) of the senate foreign relations committee asked prompt action on President Truman's request for United States participation in the international refugee organization.
