The following is taken from a report of the twenty-first anniversary of the Wesley Memorial Church, Moncton:—The contract for the building of the church was let to R. C. Donald, about the first of July, 1891, and the corner stone was laid during the latter part of the same month. The stone was laid by Dr. Thomas Walker, of St. John. Grand Master of the Free Masons for the Province of New Brunswick, who was present with his Grand Officers at the special invitation of Mr. Sangster, who is, and was at that time, prominent member of the Masonic Order. In addition to the officers mentioned, there were present many prominent Masons from all over the Province. The first pastor of the Church was the Rev. T. J. Delastadt. He was followed in the pastorate by the Rev. John Read, who was in turn succeeded by the Rev. R. S. Crisp, two pastors whose memory is cherished to the present day. Mr. Crisp was followed by the Rev. William Penna. After Mr. Penna came the Rev. H. E. Thomas, a strong temperance worker, who stirred up the agitation which resulted in the present rigid enforcement of the Scott Act. Rev. Mr. Thomas left before the expiration of his term, for Charlottetown, where he had been called to take charge of one of the largest churches in the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference. He was succeeded by the Rev. John J. Pinkerton, who was remarkably successful in his work among the young people. During his term of office, the Sunday School and Epworth League flourished as never before in the history of the Church. On his withdrawal from the pastorate, about a year ago, the Board of the church called to the pulpit the Rev. W. G. Lane, a preacher from the Nova Scotia Conference. Mr. Lane, who was Chaplain in one of the Canadian contingents in South Africa during the Boer War, has made a great success of the work, especially in the line of finances.

As to the progress made along the temperance line in Canada, the speaker said the Dominion was in advance Nova Scotia expressions on such moral questions was usually very emphatic. Halifax, the capital City, had always been in the vanguard of social, political and commercial movements, he therefore hoped to see it as the first City to raise the banner of total prohibition. A review of the statistics with regard to crime shows that Nova Scotia has a lower percentage than any Province, but Prince Edward Island. Mr. Spence then proceeded to analyze the present license law, and to make a comparison of the two systems, from which comparison his audience could form their own opinion as to which one was the better adapted to regulate the traffic. People who argue in favor of license all argue from a moral standpoint. They acknowledge the raising of money by it for public purposes to be only incidental. The law in itself is supposed to have a moral force. As to the men employed in the business he would not say a word against them. He knew many of them as men of integrity, intellectual force and business ability, but the traffic itself he would most strongly denounce. "No right has anyone to say ought against the men who we legalize to sell liquor," said Mr. Spence in referring to the licensing of the liquor traffic. "It exists because we as citizens authorize the men to sell it. Are not the citizens in the same book with the seller?"—Halifax Exc.
