THE annual meeting of the Charlottetown Mutual Fire Insurance Co., held in Farquharson Building last night was largely attended and all were satisfied with the Secretary's report. Though the expenses had been in excess of the average quite a good sum was added to the capital. The total cash on hand was \$11,440 and the company holds bonds in addition of \$6,500 for policy holders' security. After discussion as to whether the older members should have an advantage in the matter of dividends a committee composed of Geo. Coombs, A. C. Duchemin and J. A. Farquharson were appointed to formulate a principle. The following directors were re-elected: Hon. D. Farquharson (President), G. E. Hughes, Robert Fennell, W. M. Coffin, D. L. Hooper, John Gillis, Angus D. Martin.

A MEETING was held in the Y. M. C. A. last evening to discuss the Religious work of the institution. Lunch was served at six o'clock and then a conference was conducted. J. D. Seaman opened with a few words on the moral and spiritual condition of the young men of the city and a general discussion followed. The need for definite work was felt and renewed efforts will be made to help young men along this line. The Association will start on Feb 8th a course of Sunday afternoon addresses on "The Making of Manhood", the first address to be given by Rev. Dr. Smith of Summerside. It was also decided to hold a meeting each week on Thursday evening from 7 to 8 o'clock for prayer and Conference. All are invited to attend this meeting. At the close of the meeting on motion of Rev. D. B. McLeod seconded by J. P. Gordon a vote of thanks was tendered to the ladies for the part they had in making the gathering a success.

A LARGE and representative meeting of farmers was held at Marshfield last night to discuss the proposed co-operative pork factory to be established. J. Fred Fraser was present and spoke. He pointed out that hogs for 180 to 250 lbs live were best suited for market and discouraged marketing of poorly fed underized ones. They should also be supplied more regularly through the year, not all in two or three months. Mr. Fraser informed the farmers that, if they wished they could take stock in the company but any action was deferred until such time as the guarantee question is settled. All were unanimous that the companies be placed on the same footing. Speeches were also made by Messrs. Ferguson, Stewart, McInnis, McDonald and others after which a resolution thanking Davis & Fraser and their buyers Jenkins & Son for their business-like dealing in the past was carried.

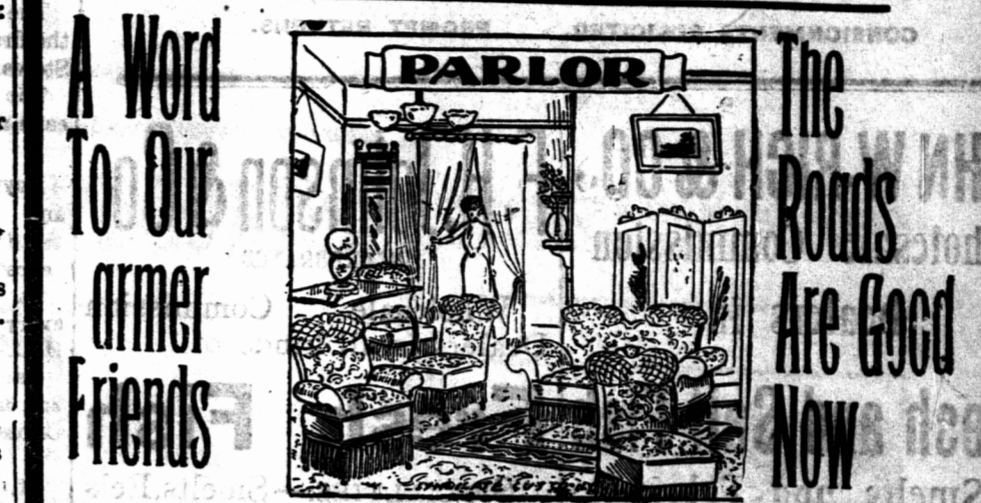
