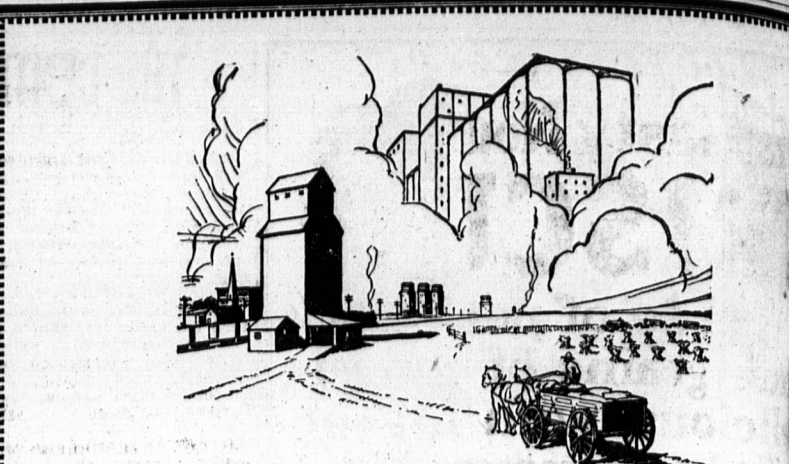

BAN ON FOREIGN GAMES BY MEMBERS OF GAELIC CLUBS DUBLIN, May 17.—The Gaelic Athletic Association has decided to retain the present ban on foreign games, which means that all games excepting Gaelic football, hurling (a kind of hockey) and handball shall not be played by anyone affiliated to the Association. It also was decided that any discussion on the removal of the ban shall be prohibited for three years.

NOT ONLY are Gaelic forbidden to any of the banned games but even their attendance at these games involves suspension.

NEW LEAGUE IS Still in Air DETROIT, Mich., May 15.—The International hockey league, which is said to be in a formative state backed by New York and Chicago promoters, to fight what they term "Tex Richard's monopoly" in the National Hockey League, has offered a franchise for a Detroit team to E.P. Strong, of Cleveland. Strong made this statement yesterday in connection with his announcement of leasing the Coliseum at the state grounds for 20 years at an annual rental of \$50,000 for a winter amusement place.

TWO weeks ago two Detroiters, laid announced the purchase of the Morris Friedberg and Morris Cap-Victoria Congars, champions of the western hockey league last winter, for \$100,000.

THE PURCHASE was made following assurance given at a meeting of National Hockey League at Montreal that the Friedberg-Caplan interests were being granted a franchise in that circuit. Actual award of the franchise was put over to another meeting of the league, after the constitution had been changed to permit admission of Detroit along with Chicago at league members.

TEX RICHARD, it was stated in hockey circles here, is behind Chicago's request for a franchise in the National Hockey League. He owns the only club in that league, Chicago interests are said to be planning cooperation with Strong to establish a rival loop.

HONOR JAPANESE PASTOR. VANCOUVER, B. C. May 14.—Rev. Y. Yoshioka, pastor of the United Japanese Mission here, has been elected to a scholarship by the council of the Japan Mission of the United Church of Canada and will proceed to Toronto or Montreal in the Fall for two or three years of special study.
