### AUTO-RAILER ARRIVES AT SUMMERSIDE

#### New Mode Of Transportation Will Be Given Demonstration This Morning.

An auto railer car, a means of transportation both on roads and on railways, arrived in Summerside last night from Arlington, Virginia.  
 In the car were Mr. H. C. Rochester, superintendent of passenger train service, C.N.R., Montreal; J. H. Carron, traffic passenger agent, C.N.R., Moncton, N.B.; Mr. Thomas McBeath, master mechanic, Montreal; and Mr. Goldman Day, driver. They were welcomed by Mayor B. W. Robinson and prominent citizens.  
 After a demonstration this morning the car will proceed to Kensington where Mr. Rochester will meet Mr. E. W. MacKinnon, superintendent of the Island Division of the Canadian National Railways. Later the party will be met in Charlottetown by W. Alistair Fraser, vice-president of the traffic division, Montreal; Mr. W. U. Appleton, general manager of the Maritime Division; Mr. W. Gagnon, Montreal, C.N.R. director; and Mr. M. F. Tompkins, C.N.R., Moncton.  
 Mr. Rochester, in an interview with a Guardian representative, said they made the trip from Arlington in 5 days, leaving there last Saturday. Also making the journey from Arlington were Mr. Thomas McBeath, master mechanic, Montreal, and the driver, Mr. Goldman Day, of the Evans Product Co. who will remain with the car as instructor for a time.  
 This new auto railer is the latest in motors of this kind and the interior is the acme of comfort and convenience. The body is steel, light green in color, and the interior is fitted up with green plush cushions to tone with the exterior with cream silk curtains. The auto railer will carry 24 passengers and the driver. Beside the racks for light luggage inside, there is a compartment at the rear for suitcases. The interesting part of this up to the minute travel car is the arrangement of the wheels. There are three pairs of rubber tires and two pairs of steel wheels. By a simple device the driver can control the car on the road or the rail. While on the road the rubber tires carry 75 per cent of weight and the steel wheels only one quarter. There are two pairs of flanged wheels which act as guides, so that a possible blowout is no hazard. And should a blowout occur the car is held in position by means of the guide wheels. All these mechanisms are operated from the driver's seat. The steel wheels are raised when the car is running on the highway. The fuel used is gasoline. The vehicle is equipped with headlights and signals for use on the railway and two road lights.  
 There are some auto railers in use in the States but these make a fact for the C.N.R. and the most up to date. They are intended to reduce operating costs on light traffic lines and can be transferred from road to rail in less than a minute.

### PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT

Whereas the Government led by the Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan and his Conservative predecessors have left a record of clean and economical administration, hampered as it was by the greatest period of industrial depression within the century, with its consequent demands for relief for unemployed, and with weakened revenues.  
 And whereas notwithstanding these serious difficulties they built the new Prince of Wales College, Falconwood Hospital, many other expensive hard surfaced highways, steel and concrete bridges, improved our educational system and Departments of Public Health, pressed for and realized large sums of money from Ottawa in part payment of our claims against the Federal Government, thus increasing our revenue without material resort to increased taxation, and conducted the business of government with the closest economy consistent with such extensive undertakings.

### C. N. R. Cheap Rates To Canadian West

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 12.—In response to the many inquiries respecting low fare fall excursions by Canadian Railways from eastern to western Canada C. P. Riddell, chairman, Canadian Passenger Association, announces that such excursion will be operated between September 18th and October 2nd. Tickets will apply from territory including the Maritime Provinces, Quebec and points in Ontario such as Windsor, Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury, Capreol, Cochrane and East, to Port Arthur, Armstrong and all points west thereof as far as the Pacific coast.  
 Railway tickets will be good going any time between September 18 and October 2 inclusive and provide for a generous time limit for the return movement of 45 days from date of purchase.  
 Generous optional routings permit of a boat trip through the Great Lakes as part of the journey with also the alternative of travelling via Chicago or Sault Ste Marie stop overs within the limit of ticket will be allowed at Port Arthur, Armstrong and west also at Chatham, Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., and west.
