## ISLAND PEOPLE IN CHICAGO

Figure in Amusing and Sensational Case

BOTH LIVED IN PRINCE CO.

Miss Bowness Regains Money, But Loses a Chance of Fishing in Life's Stream With Gordon.

CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Miss Elizabeth Brown, the Boston nurse, after furnishing the Chicago courts with one of the most alternately sensational and laughable suits ever heard here has succeeded in getting back \$1300 and a gold watch that she entrusted to Broker Allen F. Gordon of Chicago.

Mr. Gordon obtained them, so she alleges, by honeyed words and promises to marry, forgetting at the time that he had a wife.

Further trouble is in store for Mr. Gordon, since the county attorney declares that he will continue to prosecute him regardless of Miss Bowness's wish that it be not done.

Mr. Gordon's letters to Miss Bowness were the leading exhibits of the case and showed him the possessor of a masterly vocabulary of endearing epithets.

According to Gordon, Miss Bowness was his "angel bird," and he was longing for the time when he and "petite dear" could "live in a lovely little cottage that he had picked out."

When they were married, according to Mr. Gordon, they would "float down life's stream like ducks and fish for brook trout."

When Miss Bowness first met the dashing Mr. Gordon she was a trained nurse in Boston. At the first meeting Gordon fell in love with her. This was in 1887.

With his own wife far away in Chicago, Mr. Gordon, according to Miss Bowness proposed marriage, but it never came off because a long engagement was "so nice."

Mr. Gordon, according to the story he told, was just wallowing in money. He was making \$10,000 a year in his business he said and had a bank account that would make John Rockefeller take to the woods.

In 1900 he induced Miss Bowness to part with \$1300, her savings, that he might invest the same in Chicago real estate, and thereby her fortune would wax fat with increasing interest.

During the years between the meeting and the time Miss Bowness sent the money to invest, the letters passed between the two were, according to the testimony, softer than a barrel of molasses.

After Miss Bowness had corresponded, for two years and the huge dividends she expected did not come she went to Chicago to get her money from Gordon, or find out why the interest was not accruing.

Mr. Gordon's \$10,000 a year was not in evidence and he could neither produce the \$1300 nor tell where it was.

Therefore Miss Bowness hauled him to court on a charge of larceny.

Yesterday his attorney in the middle of the trial, handed Miss Bowness back her \$1300 and her gold watch she had given Gordon.

Speech Tells of Friendly Relations With Other Powers—Touches on Venezuela, Alaska, Balkan and South African Questions—India's Bright Prospects—Macedonian Affairs—Citizen Dines 150 Widows—Arrests at Prize Fight

**KING EDWARD OPENS PARLIAMENT.**  
LONDON, Feb. 17.—(Special)—The King opened Parliament in person, Queen Alexandra and the members of the Court being present.

The procession was identical with that of previous occasions.

**VENEZUELA AND ALASKA.**  
His Majesty's speech announced friendly relations with all foreign countries and announced the arrangements for the adjustment of Venezuelan matters and the determination of the Alaskan boundary.

The Nigeria expedition and the Indian Durbar were also referred to and announced the prospects for agriculture, and commerce in India are more encouraging than for years.

**MACEDONIAN REFORMS.**  
PARIS, Feb. 17.—(Special)—The Austrian Ambassador at Constantinople today presented the Porte with a note suggesting administrative and financial reforms not affecting the political status in Macedonia.

## HOW THE WAVE MOTION CARRIES THE MESSAGE THROUGH THE AIR

It Crosses the Ocean in Less than one Hundredth Part of a Second—Careless Observers Imagine that the Transit is of the Subject to Which the Wave is Composed in Reality While it is Only the Undulation.

(Insurance Chronicle, Montreal.)  
When Mr. Marconi sends a signal from Glace Bay, N. S., to Folke in England, what he does is to create a disturbance, a wave motion in—let us call it for convenience—the ether, which wave motion radiates in all directions, extends across the ocean, and probably travels much faster than light. That is to say, the wave (not the ether) crosses the ocean in less than the one-hundredth part of a second. Careless observers imagine that the transmits of the substance of which the wave is composed. Persons see a huge wave containing many tons of water approaching the shore, and they imagine that the wave itself is moving nearer to the land. What is really approaching is not the water, but an undulation of the water. At the seaside you may see two wave systems approach and actually pass through each other. These analogies are pertinent to the subject under discussion because they illustrate exactly what happens in wireless telegraphy. They serve to show how Marconi manages to hit the target every time, and how he manages to keep his messages from getting mixed up with each other.

If you throw a stone into a pond it starts a series of concentric ripples, a miniature wave system, radiating in all directions. The ripples (not the particles of water affected, cross the pond in every direction. If you throw two stones into a pond at some distance from each other, you start two wave systems. The interesting point is that when the two wave systems come into contact each pursues the even tenor of its way totally unaffected by the other. This is precisely what happens with Marconi's various systems of electric waves.

But now comes the very natural question: If a hundred electric wave systems are being radiated in all directions by a hundred Marconi sending stations, how is it possible to provide that each wave system shall reach the particular receiving station for which it is intended, and no other? As a matter of fact, each wave system will reach each and every receiving station; but each distinct wave system will only affect the receiving apparatus it is intended to affect. We shall better appreciate the possibilities in this direction if we take into consideration an analogous

## SUPREME COURT.

**THE KING vs GILLIAN; The argument for Habeas Corpus in this case was before the Court Monday and yesterday. This is a case to show cause why the prisoner should not be discharged from custody under the provisions of the Habeas Corpus Act Section 7, two terms of the Supreme Court in Prince George County having elapsed since imprisonment and no trial having taken place and no order of the Court postponing the trial having been made. Mr. Peters, K. C. Attorney General contended that the Habeas Corpus Act section 7 does not apply to such a case as this. It was only intended to apply where the prisoner had never been brought into court for trial but that the prisoner having been twice put on his trial, he is not within the provisions of the Habeas Corpus Act. He also contended that no order for postponement was necessary until the prisoner has applied for trial.**

Mr. McQuarrie, K. C., for the prisoner contends that it is the duty of the Crown not to postpone—to bring about the trial. He contended that when the jury disagreed at the November term last and were discharged a new jury should have been immediately sworn to try the prisoner and if that could not have been done an order should have been made under section 728, The Criminal Code 1892 postponing the trial of the prisoner until next June Term. Neither of these were done and Mr. McQuarrie contends that the prisoner should therefore be discharged under The Habeas Corpus Act section 7 which enacts that if a prisoner is detained in prison for two terms of the Court without being indicted and tried he shall then be discharged. The Court adjourned until 11 a. m. for judgment.

**Lecky vs McLeod.** This was a case of trespass tried at Summerside before Mr. Justice Hodgson without a jury. Judgment was yesterday given for the plaintiff and damages assessed at \$1. The Judge agreed to certify for costs if required.

**McLeod vs Lecky.** The facts of this case as above case and rested on the same proof. Judgment for the defendant.
