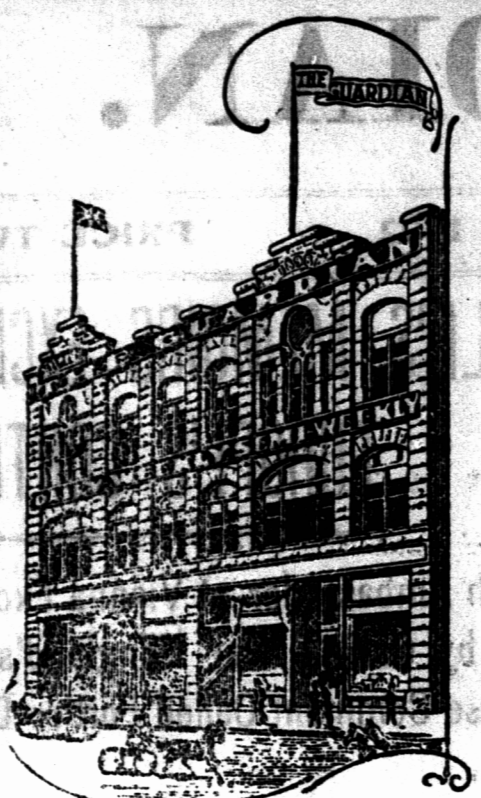

THE PROHIBITORY LAW.

The highly encouraging meeting of the friends of prohibition held in the Y. M. C. A. parlour on Friday evening last resulted in the appointment of a large and influential committee to wait upon the Government in the interest of better enforcement. It was gratifying to see the deep interest in the subject which was shown at the meeting. The time of public apathy had lasted too long and while the watchmen had been sleeping the enemy had made sad inroads. While the large body of sober citizens had been apathetic, the prosecutor neglected his duties, and the Government did not call him to account very sharply for his inaction. For a time things were going very much the liquor men's way and drunkards daily reeled, staggered, fought and blasphemed about our streets.

These painful conditions and some stirring addresses recently aroused the public conscience and awakened a sense of shame in the orderly portion of the community. This awakened public sentiment is the new hope of the hour. May it be kept awake, for unless it is, the always alert enemy will speedily gain a new advantage. We trust and hope that on the strength of representations made by the committee the Government will appoint a prosecutor who will with energy and fidelity set about securing the conviction and re-conviction of the persistent violators of the law. The Government owes this to the community and to themselves. Having framed and enacted the law they should see that it is not violated with impunity. The credit of the city demands this at their hands. And once the machinery is again set in operation and kept in operation to enforce the law, we believe public sentiment will actively and continuously support such action.

The lawless men engaged in the unlawful sale of liquor possess many of the characteristics of unruly cattle. A good fence and an active watch will soon bring them to order and keep them from farther trespass. But once let vigilance be relaxed and the fence broken down here and there, the cattle will hold daily and nightly riot in the farmers' grainfields. Eternal vigilance is said to be the price of liberty. It is the price which the farmer pays for the protection of his crops. It is the price we must pay for the good fruits of prohibition. The price is not too much to pay for a sober town, for the happier homes, for the youth saved from the drink-curse. We must make up our minds to pay the price, but at the same

time we may rest assured that the investment will pay a thousand fold. The difference between one young man made a worthless sot, and the same young man saved to live a useful and honored life cannot be counted in hundreds of dollars. And the effectual closing of the rum dens means the moral salvation of hundreds of such young men.

What has been done for temperance and prohibition in our city in years past and what is now being done is largely the work of a faithful and energetic few men and women. Their number includes worthy city pastors, business men and now and then a rare politician who has the courage to stand up boldly for prohibition. All honor to these men and women. The hearts and good wishes of thousands of others are with them, but these thousands are slow to move or act, except as others lead the way. This is in the nature of things. But there is an immense volume of public sentiment ready to stand in passive, perhaps more or less active, support of prohibition, and which would rejoice in seeing the law vigorously enforced. The law will not enforce itself, but with a prosecutor whose heart is in the work, backed by the support of the Government and a active temperance sentiment, the work of its enforcement will not be difficult. We hope now to see these favorable conditions surrounding the operation of prohibition in this City.

An important delegation composed of eleven prominent members of the London, England Chamber of Commerce are now in New York and have accepted the invitation of the Montreal Board of Trade to visit that city. They will also spend a day each at Ottawa, Toronto and Niagara Falls. Communications have passed between the Halifax Board of Trade and President Horace Hazard of the Maritime Board of Trade suggesting the desirability of inviting the distinguished visitors to return by way of Halifax, taking in St. John and Charlottetown by the way. The idea is a capital one, although it is yet uncertain whether they will be able to accept at this late season of the year.

MR. KRUGER CHANGES.
