Wanted To Stand In

Admiral Decker believes that if the United States had not entered the war Spain would have plunged in to help Germany. Her motive was not sympathy for Germany so much as a desire to stand well with the victor, and as long as she picked Germany as the winner the danger remained.

Enter the Toreador

But the vital factor in the crisis was not the press bureau, but a bullfighter, Belmonte, the most famous toreador in Spain, who was known to have pro-Ally sentiments. On his return from a triumphal tour of several South American countries, the press bureau secured an interview from him in which he flatly came out as a friend of the Allies.

Wrong Impressions

Sir,—During the course of discussions of the farmers some wrong impressions were left. It was suggested that the value of the Dairy products of Canada was now over \$200,000,000 annually.

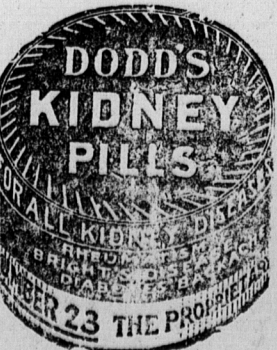
The figures for Ontario and Manitoba for 1919 are just published and show that the two provinces themselves approximate \$100,000,000 yearly.

Farm and Dairy (issue Jan. 15, 1920) states that the total value of the milk produced in Canada in 1919, whether consumed direct or used in the manufacture of various products, will amount to very nearly \$250,000,000—of which about \$85,000,000 worth will be exported.

On P. E. I. the yearly output is about \$5,000,000 and about one million dollars worth is sold outside the province.

Again it was stated at the Dairy meeting and again referred to at the Rotary Club Luncheon that Canada was not fairly treated by the British Minister of Food in the matter of cheese prices. In answer to that charge Dr. Jas. W. Robertson defends Great Britain's stand with the statement that Britain lost 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 cents on every pound of Canadian cheese she bought in 1919 and may have to lose still more.

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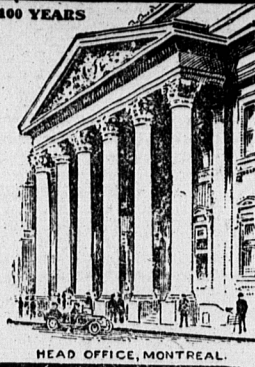
