McDonald impressively renewed their marriage vows last evening at the reception held in honor of the golden wedding anniversary in the social hall of the Presbyterian church. Dr. R. O. Fifty years an instructor at St. Mary's College. And a Christian Brother for 60 years next July, Brother Vincentius Leo T. celebrates his golden anniversary at the Moraga school.

What does he teach? Practically everything. For the first 10 years it was literature, public speaking and religion. Then when a school of engineering was founded at St. Mary's in 1911 he was selected to teach mathematics and sciences—and taught for 30 years in a totally different field than the one of his choice!

So it is not only a long career, but a remarkable one. That of "White Leo"—thusly called because of his white hair, and to distinguish him from his lecturer-name-sake, Brother Leo.

Born of Prince Edward Island pioneer parents in San Francisco, he attended the old Sacred Heart college, took the vows at Christian Brothers Novitiate, and began teaching at St. Joseph's academy, at Fifth and Jackson streets, Oakland. In 1891 he came to St. Mary's.

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In Memoriam

DR. A. F. COOPER

Dr. Arthur Fennimore Cooper, a prominent dentist in Eureka, Calif., for many years, passed away in a San Francisco hospital on January 6. He was also a well known dairy man and stock raiser. About two years ago he became ill with severe headaches and attacks of blindness. He was taken to San Francisco for treatment and his trouble pronounced cancer on the brain. He remained in the hospital until his death.

Dr. Cooper leaves a wife and three children; also one brother John W. Cooper, who conducts a mortuary parlor in Eureka. Dr. Cooper was for many years and up to the time of his death an Elder in the Presbyterian Church and was also a member of the club.

Born in Arcata Calif., 62 years ago, Dr. Cooper was the eldest son of Pioneer John W. Cooper and therefore a native of California. William Cooper who, in December 1849, built a ship and with his family and a few friends sailed from San Francisco, California, bound for San Francisco, California where they arrived in July, 1850. During the trip they never tied up to a port nor dropped anchor until they arrived in San Francisco Bay. After trading around the Bay a few months Captain Cooper sold his vessel and returned to P. E. I. He never returned. During the winter of 1850-51 and epidemic of the Cooper family. In the Spring of 1851 what was left of the family came to Humboldt County and then to the history of the celebrated Cooper family and the Indian wars and massacres of northern California. — Oakland Maple Leaf.

GEORGE HARVEY STEWART

"Home is the sailor, home from the sea, And the hunter home from the hill"

On Thursday, March 13, 1941, there passed away at St. Martha's Hospital, Antigonish, George Harvey Stewart, a native of Prince Edward Island and a well-known farmer of Bayfield, N.S., after a brief illness. He entered the hospital on his seventy-fifth birthday, March 4.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. MacQueen at the MacIsaac Funeral Home in Antigonish. Interment was at Upper South River in Antigonish County.

Son of the late John Benjamin Stewart and Elizabeth (Dewar) Stewart, Mr. Stewart was born in Lot 48, P.E.I. in 1866. Following graduation from Prince of Wales College he became a successful agriculturist. His marriage to Mary Elizabeth MacGregor, daughter of the late John A. MacGregor, Springfield, Antigonish County, and Christian MacGregor, South River Lake, took place on August 29, 1923. Twelve years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Stewart and son moved to Nova Scotia and settled in Bayfield, where he was respected as a solid citizen. The late Mr. Stewart was a member of the Christian church at Cross Roads, P. E. Island, and at Bayfield was an adherent of the United Church.

Besides his widow, Mr. Stewart is survived by a son, John Benjamin, at home.

War services Campaign

At the War Services campaign headquarters yesterday, D. J. Bonnell, Provincial Chairman, stated the announcement made by the Hon. A. L. Hiley, that an allowance of 40 per cent. income tax deduction on War Service contributions was effective before April 7th of this year.

Sterns and completed their plans for the zoning of the City for the distribution of envelopes for the Canadian War Services Campaign. Mrs. Sterns is assisted by Mrs. D. L. MacIsaac, Mrs. L. MacIsaac, Mrs. H. A. Messervy, Mrs. Arthur Mutch, Miss E. Bagnall and Mrs. G. D. Fitzgerald.

Another committee of ladies headed by Mrs. Frank Fraser and assisted by Mrs. Hal Warren and Mrs. Arthur Henry, has undertaken the canvassing of Fraternal Societies and City schools.

Because "folks back home" are eager to back up their boys in Canada's fighting forces, small communities and rural areas will play important roles in the \$5,500,000 campaign of the Canadian War Services Fund to be launched on March 26th from coast to coast. Proceeds will be shared by the Canadian Legion, I.O.O.F., Knights of Columbus, Salvation Army, Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., on a basis approved by the Dominion Government.

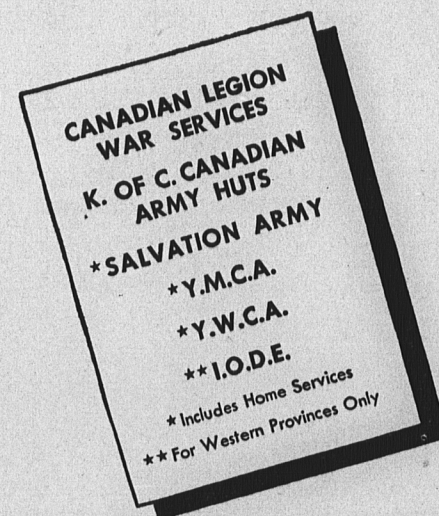

NINE MILE CREEK W. I.

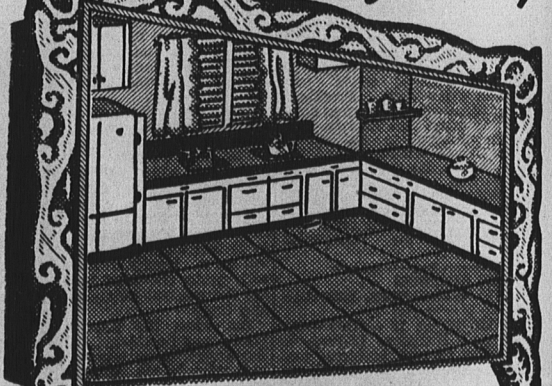
