LITERARY NOTE.—The International Monthly for March is a strong number. Will H. Low writes on National Expression in American Art, especially applied to building and decorating. Art in the old world has arrived at maturity in certain directions. Mr. Low writes in the most optimistic strain of the possibilities open to American designers. Andre Leben, who has held the Ministry of Commerce in France, writing on The Situation of France in International Commerce is very confident of her ability to hold her own in certain lines. He gives a graphic description of the conditions under which manufacture, trade, and agriculture exist in that country, and enumerates the advantages to be derived from various commercial and international movements. The Problem of development by Prof. T. H. Morgan is a timely and valuable contribution to education. as is also an essay on Child-Study and Education by James Sully, of London. Every one should read E. R. L. Gould's paper on Civic Reform and Social Progress. Mr. Gould is prominent in the attempt to bring about reform in New York, and whatever he has to say is worth reading. The great virtue of the magazine is the authoritative character of contents, never beyond the average reader, and presented in an interesting form. Baden-Powell who is loudly praised even by the officers of the Boer forces. Several instances of the bravery and valor of the Canadians were recounted, among them the voluntary carrying of an important message by Lieut. Lorus Stewart in the face of great danger and exposure to the deadly fire of its Boers. A high tribute of praise was paid to the clergymen of the contingent, also to the French Canadian part of it, no truer courage being displayed by any of our men than by the French Canadians. In closing the lecturer touched upon the vastness and greatness of the British Empire and the bonds which bind the colonies to the Mother Country which binds the trouble in South Africa has done much to strengthen. The National Anthem closed a most interesting, instructive and successful course of lectures.
