son after his arrival at Fort McPherson until December when Indian runners complained to F.C. M.P. officers their traps in Rat River district were being robbed. When officers reached the cabin to investigate they were met with wild yells and gunfire. Constable King was seriously wounded, and his companion, Constable McDowell was fatally wounded by a pursuer, a mile route to get King to hospital. Another party went to the cabin and was held at bay 18 hours by heavy fire from the log fortress. Even dynamite failed to dislodge him. Police were forced to seek reinforcements but when they returned the cabin was deserted.

Fifteen miles away a lone constable located Johnson in a log stockade. Constable Millen attempted to shoot it out but the trapper, an expert shot, firing from his shelter, fatally wounded his pursuer, and fled before the rest of the party could reach the scene.

It was from the air Johnson finally was discovered. A constable sighted him while scouting with Captain "Wop" May, piloting a supply aeroplane. The trapper went down, mortally wounded, fighting posse members who surrounded him in the scrub brush. Another officer was wounded. No one knows whose bullet killed Johnson, the mystery man of the north.

One old prospector claimed he knew Johnson's real identity. He said the story had all too close a bearing on the Royal House of Sweden. But he fold no more and identified the "Mad Trapper of Rat River" today as a great a mystery as ever.
