MR. J. HOWARD McDONALD

In seconding the Address Mr. J. Howard MacDonald, Fifth District of Prince, took the opportunity of congratulating the Speaker upon his appointment last year...

Mr. Lea Answered

Mr. Strong: "Does my hon. friend know that woolen hosiery is cheaper today in Canada than ever it was?"

Mr. Lea: "Does my hon. friend know that it is very much cheaper in Britain?"

Mr. Strong: "But isn't it cheaper in Canada?"

Mr. Lea: "Only for the tariff it would be still cheaper. In Britain today a complete suit of the best tailor-made serge can be purchased for \$27.00."

Mr. Strong: "I was speaking of woolen hosiery; and the wool is bought from Canadian farmers."

Mr. Lea: "It is not bought at all; they take it for nothing."

Mr. Strong: "Then they must get it for less than nothing in England!" (Applause.)

Continuing, Mr. Lea repeated that the present Government was largely responsible for the farmers' plight.

Mr. J. A. McDonald: "What do you mean by the present Government?"

Mr. Lea: "The present Federal Government."

Mr. MacDonald: "I think you are all astray. We are not discussing Federal politics here."

Mr. Lea: "At present I am making my speech."

Continuing, the Opposition leader complained that due to high protection great fortunes had been created until only three per cent of the people of Canada were able to pay income tax.

Efforts should be directed, not so much at reducing production on the farm as at lowering production costs, he suggested.

Mr. Lea was pleased to note the Government had been well represented at all the Agricultural Conferences during the year. He must however, criticize Hon. Mr. Sharp, while Minister of Agriculture, for having missed a great opportunity.

Frank Commendation

Mr. Lea frankly credited the Minister of Education with doing well in obtaining "a grant of \$70,000." He contended however, that the Government had "done little" to promote the dairy industry...

The success of the Central School Fair, Mr. Lea suggested, justified his attitude as to the importance of central exhibitions.

Reverting again to dairying, he said the farmers are being driven into this industry today, and this government should give them leadership. Cow testing and cheap distribution of males were suggested as two important measures which should have been adopted.

Mr. Lea On Cranberries

The Guardian had addressed an editorial to him (Mr. Lea) in regard to the cranberry industry. In looking over the Speech however he regretted to notice the absence of any reference to cranberries. He remembered how the member from 3rd Prince (Hon. Mr. Arsenault) used to ridicule the report of the cranberry expert who was brought here under the Lib-

eral regime. This man, Prof. Franklin of United States had been recommended to Mr. Lea as a specialist. The total cost of his report to the government was \$85. Nova Scotia also employed the same man. The expert finding was that the cost of cranberry cultivation would be \$1,500 an acre. He (Mr. Lea) was always a little cautious about advising farmers to incur heavy expenditures on work of an experimental kind. He preferred to promote the industries which he considered of most importance.

Mr. Lea figured that if the 45,000 dairy cows in the province, by better feeding methods and more careful attention, increased production by 3 pounds a day, it would amount to 1100 lbs of milk a year per cow or at present prices to an increase of \$350,000 on the basis of last year's prices.

Comments Health Measures

All that was possible to promote the public health of this Province was being done by the present Minister of Health and Education, Mr. Lea said. The Conservatives could not have selected a better man for this position; but they should remember that the Liberals also had given attention to health matters.

The question of increased cost of maintenance of the Provincial Sanatorium, the rebuilding of Falconwood Hospital, and other matters could be better discussed at a later time, Mr. Lea said. The present debate was "largely academic," and for that reason he would curtail his remarks.

The demand for economy has been made by organizations which previously were loud in their requests for governmental expenditure. Mr. Lea could recall listening for no less than eight petitions from the Associated Boards of Trade for expenditures on the part of the Government. "Anyone who charges us with extravagance should remember that we were carrying on affairs of government during years of great prosperity and that a great proportion of the expenditure then made was to promote industries that were yielding the Province a great increase of taxation. Expenditures that could be counted justifiable at that time, under present conditions become unwarranted."

Any criticism which the opposition had to offer with regard to the cost of Prince of Wales College and Falconwood Hospital would be reserved until the figures were available, Mr. Lea said in conclusion.

HON. DR. MACMILLAN

Following Mr Lea in the capacity of acting leader of the House, Dr. the Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, Minister of Health and Education, expressed regret at the necessity of this duty devolving upon him for the time being. "I feel," he added, "that the whole House shares in my regret that the Hon. the Premier of the Province is not able to be here. I think it is universally recognized that the Premier's breakdown in health was due to his steadfast attention to the public services of the province. It is not necessary to go into any details on that point, or to cite the difficulties, the many duties and responsibilities, that a leader of a Government, during these times of stress and depression, must grapple with. I say, quite sincerely, that if the Hon. Mr. Stewart's health is endangered, and seriously endangered, it is directly due to his loyalty and devotion to his public duties, and for that reason I say with regret that the duty of carrying on for the time being devolves upon me."

Reference was made by the speaker to the regrettable absence of Dr. MacNeill, who, however, was now improving in health, and it was hoped would be in his seat before the end of the session. The Summerside people so much appreciated the provisions made for high school training. Dr. MacMillan added, that he expected Dr. MacNeill to bring a vote of thanks along with him.

The leader of the Opposition seemed to be fairly satisfied with the Speech from the Throne, the only omission to which he objected being a "cranberry clause." If that clause had been there the speech would have been a masterpiece. Mr. Lea had settled the cranberry proposition during his own period of office. "He gave credit to the
