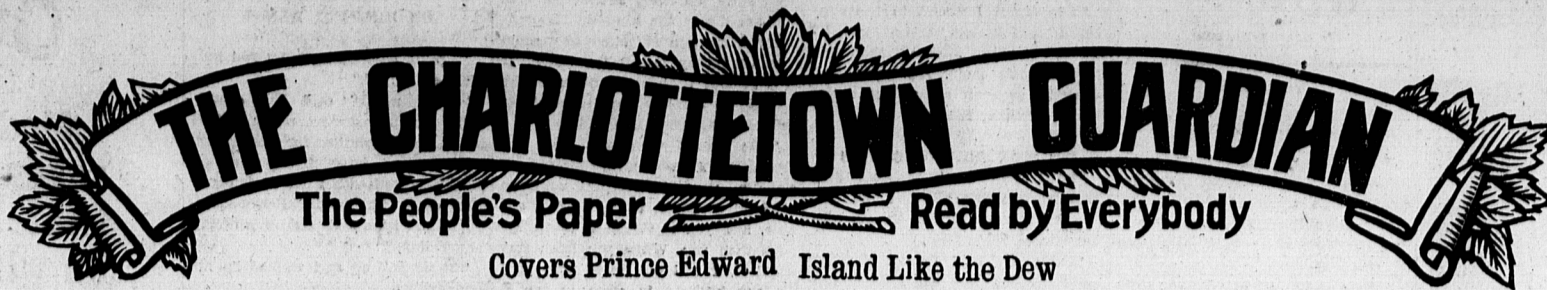

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 8.—Four hundred silver black foxes, nearly one hundred raccoons and a score of mink were shipped from Halifax tonight for European points. The greater part of the shipment was taken by the Pennland, opening the White Star-Red Star winter schedule for Plymouth, Cherbourg and Antwerp. All foxes shipped were of Prince Edward Island stock, although a part of the consignment came from San Bernardino, California, and Winnipeg, where they were raised from animals originally purchased in the Island.

More Than Four Million lbs. Butter

LANDED AT HALIFAX IN ONE CARGO FROM NEW ZEALAND

HALIFAX, Dec. 7.—Bringing 4,400,000 pounds of butter, meats and sundries, the Shaw, Saville and Albion steamer Karanga, Captain Ogilvie, arrived last evening from New Zealand via New York and will dock this morning at Pier 20 to discharge. A supply of refrigerator cars is already placed on the siding along the pier to allow of quick despatch of the butter to Upper Canada and western cities, where most of the cargo is destined for.

Steamer Sinks In Bristol Channel With All Hands

LONDON, Dec. 7.—The British steamship Radyr of 2,358 tons was reported to have sunk with all hands today in the Bristol channel. The Radyr previously had reported by wireless that it was sinking and that the crew was having difficulty in launching lifeboats. It gave its position as off Hartland Point, which is a lofty promontory at the south entrance of the Bristol Channel. The Radyr carried a crew of 20 or 25 men. The ship was seen to disappear off Hartland Point and it was feared that all hands had been lost.

Situation Said To Be Grave In China

SHANGHAI, Dec. 6.—All sources this morning agreed that General Chiang Kai Shek, President of the Council of the Nationalist Government was still continuing to direct affairs at Nanking. There had been reports that he had already withdrawn from office because of the widespread revolt. The British owners of the North China Daily News in commenting on the situation this morning said local political and business circles view the situation as extremely grave, the worst since 1927. Responsible Chinese take a pessimistic attitude.

Terrible Gale
