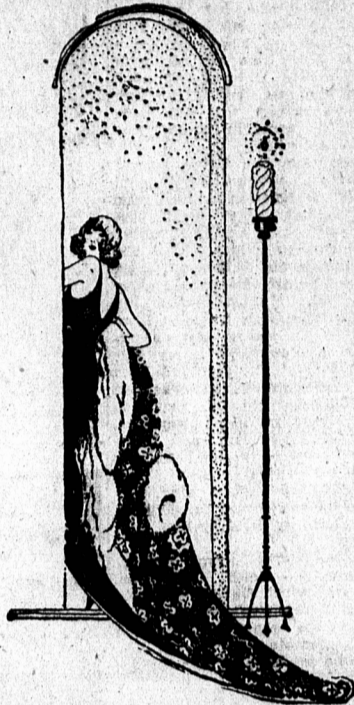

- Here are some of the articles:—Babbitt Metals: With lead and tin. Hard Lead: Mixed with lead. Solder: and other soft metal alloys. Type Metal: 12 per cent Antimony. Rubber: Sulphurates of Antimony are indispensable to the rubber trade. 56 million pounds used yearly in United States. Collapsible Tubes as "Tinfoil" for tooth paste, shaving soaps, etc. Paints, Pigments and Enamels: White Oxide of Antimony paints are in great demand for ships bottoms, etc., being non-poisonous, impervious to action of salt or fresh water. Silverware: Britannia Metal known as "White Metal". Glass: As a clarifier or purgative. Medicine: In Tartar Emelic, etc. Jewelry: In "Antimony Glass," etc. Cloth and Paper: As coloring material. Matches: Without phosphorus. Lamp Shades: Yellow, opaque glass. Wool: As a macerating agent. Antiseptics: Antimony salts with Fibrocol. Thermo Electric Couples.
