CANADA-SOVIET TRADE RELATIONS RESUMED

ADDITIONAL BANK DIRECTORS APPOINTED

LEROY HOLMAN AMONG NEW APPOINTEES

Final Steps In Partial Nationalization Of Bank of Canada Completed.

OTTAWA, Sept. 11—Final steps in the partial nationalization of the Bank of Canada were taken today when the government acquired 100,000 class B shares and appointed six additional directors to represent those holdings thus assuring government ownership and control. This is in accordance with legislation adopted at the last session of Parliament.

In selecting the public's representatives on the board of directors the government was enabled to give representation to those provinces not already represented in the seven directors now serving. Those named tonight were:

Robert McQueen, Winnipeg, head of the department of economics, University of Manitoba. He is a native of Edmonton and is 38 years old.

Auguste C. Picard, Quebec, vice-president of the Rock City Tobacco Company Limited, a native of Quebec where he was born in 1891.

George G. Coote, Nanton, Alberta, a farmer and from 1921 to 1935 a member of the House of Commons where he was one of the most eloquent financial critics in the United Farmers Group. He was born at Oakville, Ont., in 1880.

Duplessis Wields Axe In Effecting Further Economy

QUEBEC, Sept. 11 — Premier Maurice Duplessis swung the axe of economy today, fulfilling in part his campaign pledges made before his Union Nationale party ousted the 40-year-old Liberal administration in the general election Aug. 17. The Premier today announced abolition of Le Journal d'Agriculture, provincial farm paper, with an annual saving of \$100,000, and cancelled a Liberal government contract with Signs of Canada Limited for manufacture of automobile license plates.

Exchange of Cables
Renewal of trade relations was accomplished by an exchange of cables arranged by Mr. Euler before he left the Soviet. They were between himself and S. K. Sudjin, acting people's commissar for foreign trade, acting for the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

Mr. Euler cabled: "On behalf of my government I have the honor to inform you that the Government of Canada have decided to cancel the Order-in-Council of Feb. 27, 1931, pursuant to which the importation into Canada of certain commodities originating in the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics was prohibited."

"I would appreciate an immediate acknowledgment by telegram."

Mr. Sudjin replied: "I beg to confirm the receipt of your telegraphic communication to the effect that the Canadian Government have decided to cancel the Order-in-Council of February 27, 1931, pursuant to which the importation into Canada of certain commodities originating in the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics was prohibited."

"I hereby inform you that in consequence of the above I shall cancel my order of April 20, 1931, prohibiting all importing organizations and trade representatives of the U. S. S. R. to make any purchases of goods of Canadian origin as well as the chartering of vessels sailing under the Canadian flag."

"In making the announcement Mr. King said it was expected Canada would find a considerable market in Soviet Russia for dairy cows, pedigree livestock, and cattle for restocking Russian farms, horses."

Japanese Rush Warships To Far East Danger Zone

(C. P. - Havas) SHANGHAI, Sept. 11—With one Japanese destroyer off Pakhoi and five other war vessels driving at full speed toward that port, the Sino-Japanese dispute seemed near a crisis tonight.

Martial law was proclaimed in Pakhoi, where a Japanese resident was recently killed by a mob, by Gen. Ong Chao-Yuan, one of the 19th route army commanders who still refuses to admit the authority of Premier Chiang Kay-Shek.

This has increased fears that Chinese soldiers will take some step to provoke Japanese military action.

Canton Commissioner T'yan, provisionally in charge of foreign affairs for Kwangtung Province, asked Japanese Consul Yoshitake to obtain the recall of the investigation committee which Japan ordered to Pakhoi following the murder of the druggist, Junzo Nakano. He declared the presence in western Kwangtung of remnants of the old 19th route army would make it impossible for Chinese authorities to assure the safety of the commission.

Or his part Consul Yoshitake protested against the attitude of Chinese officials, charging they are attempting to lessen the importance of the Pakhoi incident and to avoid responsibility for it. He reiterated the Japanese warning that if China does not assure the safety of Japanese residents there the Tokyo government will take "such measures as are judged necessary."
