PROCEEDINGS OF THE SUMMER SCHOOL

A Story of Dumas.

One day Alexandre Dumas visited Marselles and made a trip to the Chateau d'Iff to visit the palace he had helped to make famous. The guide showed him everything; also the subterranean passage by which Edmond Dantes and Abbe Faria used to visit each other. "This passage was dug by Abbe Faria by the aid of a fish bone," the guide explained. "M. Dumas tells about it in his story of 'Monte Cristo.'" "Indeed!" replied the author. "Alexandre Dumas must be familiar with all the surroundings here. Perhaps you know him?" "I should think so! He is one of my best friends." "And you are one of his," replied the impulsive scribe, letting 2 louis d'or slip into the hand of the astonished guide.

ENGLISH LITERATURE.

In spite of the many attractions of the science classes, and the fact that literature is not one of the scholarly subjects, the literature class can challenge comparison both in numbers and in the interest displayed by the students.

The object of this course of lessons is to learn how to read a novel and a play so as to get the greatest possible amount of pleasure from them. The first two lessons were devoted to the construction of a novel, and 'The Mill on the Floss' will come for final discussion on Thursday, the 29th. In the meantime, an hour a day is given to reading and discussing 'Hamlet.' A full and detailed study of the play is obviously out of the question in such a short time, so the attention of the class is directed to those points which best illustrate Shakespeare's dramatic power, and his skill in characterization. An attempt is made to get a view of the play in broad outline in such measure as is possible and impression that would result from seeing it acted. The main interest of course is found in Hamlet's character, and in the effort to answer, as best may be, that never finally answered question that fascinates every reader of Shakespeare: 'Why did Hamlet hesitate?'

A great deal of help has been drawn from Professor Bradley's powerful study of Shakespearean tragedy. The members of the class have followed readily and eagerly the lines of study indicated and nowhere has the instructor met with more sympathetic and interested response. The class numbers about sixty, and the regularity of attendance has been gratifying.

The Garden Party given by the Charlottetown members of the Summer School on Monday to the visiting members, was a most enjoyable affair. The afternoon was spent in boating, bathing, tennis, etc. At 3:30 o'clock the party sat down to a bounteous repast. The spirit of work prevades the school to such an extent that even a garden party could not pass without some work being done. After refreshments, Sergeant Armitage gave a lesson to the drill class. The spectators enjoyed it very much.
