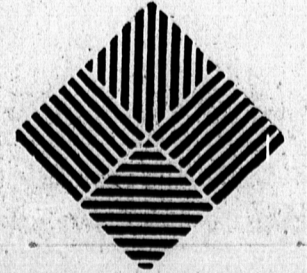

Test for Astigmatism
