In the United States, on the other hand, the members of the house of representatives are perfectly free to ignore President Taft's recommendations without in any way affecting his tenure of office or their own. Then again the United States senate is free to defeat any measure the house may pass, but the Canadian senate has no power to amend or reject a money bill. Futile, their efforts may be, however, some outspoken insurgents are to be found among the government supporters, including Hon. Clifford Sifton and Messrs. MacDonald, (P.E. I.), Harris, (Brantford), Toimie, (North Bruce) and Sealey, (Wentworth). Indeed, the alignment upon the measure, so far as the personal preferences of the members go, bids fair to be along geographical rather than political lines. The farmers and cattle men of the west, and the dairymen along the St. Lawrence and in the eastern townships, are generally quoted as being pleased with the agreement. Several members, however, report that their constituents even in these districts are far from being united and fear ultimate effect of the agreement from the national standpoint. As Mr. Broder, (Dundas), put it "the agreement is political rather than commercial, more politics than patriotism." Mr. Broder, however, is not at present opposing the measure, but like many other members is engaged in studying the complex schedules presented and is consulting with his constituents. While the resolution may not be opposed or even supported on strictly party lines, it is probable that a long debate will ensue and that many members of the opposition will both speak and vote against them.
