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FOOTBALL AND CRICKET TEAM.

St. JOHN, May 5.—(Special).—Alex. Rankin, aged 72, a prominent Oddfellow, died to-day.

SHOT HIMSELF FATALLY.  
MONTREAL, May 5.—(Special).—Alex. Sabiston, Manager of the Sabiston Lithographic Co., accidentally shot himself dead to-day.

The largest of the North German steamers has just been fitted up with Marconi's system of wireless telegraphy, and the vessel has been in experimental communication with Marconi's stations in the Isle of Wight and at Poole, most satisfactory developments ensuing. Germany has thus taken the lead in being the first country to equip passenger steamers with wireless telegraphy. There is every probability now, of course of every ship in the German Lloyd fleet of fifty-two steamers being similarly furnished with Marconi's apparatus; in fact, the Wireless Telegraph Company, who carried out the installation on the first vessel, confidently hope that they will have the honor of accomplishing the important innovation. The efficiency of such communication on board, say, an Atlantic liner, must be readily apparent, and one of the directors of Marconi's company, seen by a representative of the Westminster Gazette, looks for most extraordinary development in this direction before long. "When, as we expect," he said, "every steamer in the North German Lloyd Company is fitted with a receiver and a transmitter it will be possible to carry on a constant communication from ship to ship; and see what this may mean! Should fire break out on a ship a hundred miles distant from another Marconis equipped vessel, it will be perfectly easy to advise the latter of the event giving longitude and latitude. A message transmitted over a shorter space would, it is plain, be the medium for speedy assistance in case of danger."

## ROBERTS MOVING ON TOWARDS PRETORIA

A General Advance of the British Forces is Now Going On.

### MUCH HARD FIGHTING IS BEING EXPERIENCED

Hopeful Outlook—Experts Puzzled—Pretoria May Yet fall By May Fifteenth—The End of the War Now Thought To Be Near.

ROBERTS MOVING ON WINBURG.  
LONDON, May 5.—(Special).—Lord Roberts whole force is now apparently moving on Winburg.

The belief is that Roberts is going north-eastward to Bethlehem instead of to Kroonstadt.

This would compel the Boers to leave the Drakensburg range and pass and open the way to advance for Gen. Buller.

HOPE FOR MAFEKING.  
News of the relief of Mafeking is now expected daily by a force operating between Warrenton and Taunee.

LONDON'S GAY SEASON.  
London City is unusually gay. The first drawing-room will be held May 11, at which the Queen will be present.

It will be brilliantly attended, May 24 being also an unusual celebration in Her Majesty's honor and royalty will open the great national bazaar for the army.

BOER PRISONERS FOR CEYLON.  
COLOMBO, Ceylon, May 5.—It is expected that a batch of Boer prisoners will be sent here. The Imperial Government has approached the Ceylon authorities on the subject and has asked them to suggest a good site for a camp.

MEN WERE PANIC-STRICKEN.  
LONDON, May 5.—The Gazette contains General French's report of the disaster to the Suffolk regiment in the Colesburg district January 5, which he attributes entirely to the fact that a majority of the four companies of the regiment engaged

were seized with panic and retired. He pays high tribute to the officers of the regiment and the men who remained with them.

COST OF THE WAR.  
Replying to a question in the house of Commons to-day, the Right Hon. Robert William Hanbury, financial secretary to the treasury, stated that the total cost of the war up to March 31 had been £23,250,000.

LATER—SUNDAY.  
NEW YORK, May 6.—(Special).—The papers say that Lord Roberts is fighting his way step by step towards the Transvaal Capital, driving the Boer forces before him.

A GENERAL ADVANCE—HARD FIGHTING.  
Gen. Hamilton is leading the advance on the British right and pressing his troops. Gen. Olver may yet be cut off.

Gen. Broadwood's Brigade of Cavalry and Mounted Infantry are battling hard. The whole British army is active and advancing all along the line.

THE EXPERTS ARE PUZZLED.  
The experts are as much puzzled as the Boers in regard to the point Field Marshal Roberts is aiming at—whether he will keep to the line of railway or diverge eastward to Bethlehem.

BRITISH PUBLIC NOW VERY HOPEFUL.  
The eve of the war is now thought to be in sight. England will not be surprised if Pretoria falls by May 15th, as was predicted.

## CANADA'S VAST PEAT BOGS

Substance is Prepared in Various Ways and Used as Fuel at Slight Cost.

The best authorities say there are 100,000 acres of undeveloped peat bog in Ontario, principally in the counties of Perth, Welland, and Essex. The largest area lies in the County of Perth, eight miles north of the City of Stratford, on the Grand Trunk railway. Here is a swamp of 40,000 acres, with a depth of peat bog that varies from a foot to twenty feet. The process of manufacture is as follows: The peat is cut and air dried, after

which it is pulverized by being passed through a picker, and automatically deposited in a hopper, which feeds a steel tube about two inches in diameter and fifteen inches long. The pulverized peat is forced through this tube by pressure and formed into cylindrical blocks three inches in length and almost equal in density to anthracite coal. The fuel is non-friable and weatherproof by reason of its solidity and the extreme glaze imparted to it by frictional contact with forming dies. The inherent moisture of the peat is reduced to 12 per cent of the mass. In weight it compares with coal as follows: Eighty-three pounds per cubic foot of peat equal seventy-three pounds of bituminous or ninety-three pounds of anthracite coal.

It is claimed for peat that it is superior to coal in its absolute freedom from sulphur and the absence of smoke, soot, dust, and clinkers during consumption. In a great measure this solves the problem of furnishing a cheap, clean, uniform, and reliable fuel for all domestic purposes, as it is equally serviceable for grates, stoves, cooking ranges and furnaces, giving a long, bright flame and intense heat almost from the moment of ignition. It has been tested in locomotives with excellent results, showing that the thermal value of 100 pounds of peat is equal to 95.15 pounds of coal. It was also tried at the powerhouse of the Metropolitan street railway, Toronto, and gave great satisfaction. The heat produced was much greater than that of the coal, but it was 8 per cent deficient in lasting power. It requires but little draft and burns best in a shallow firebox.

The machinery used in manufacturing peat fuel is not expensive and requires but little attention when in operation. —Buffalo Express.

## NO PEI PRODUCE ON HALIFAX MARKET

HALIFAX, April 5.—Butter is down to the normal price in this market. Nova Scotia creamery tub sells at 20 cents wholesale and print at 21 cents. The trade is active, supplies fairly liberal and a good demand. Nova Scotia dairy tubs, which all along have been unobtainable now sell at 18 cents, to 20 cents. A good class of dairy prints is coming in, which sells at 20 cents and 21 cents; Canadian dairy rolls sell at 17c. Eggs are down a half cent within the past week, and now can be bought at 11c. to 12c. Good Nova Scotia eggs command the latter figure, while Prince Edward Island eggs at 11c. They can be bought at 11c. on the Island, and it costs about a half cent to land them in Halifax. Cheese has declined a half cent and is

quoted at 12c. to 12½c. It was expected that there would have been some arrivals of Prince Edward Island potatoes ere this, but no cargoes have yet come, ice on the coast preventing the sailing of vessels. A large quantity is sure to come, and prices doubtless will decline even from the low mark of 28c. that now stands. Cornwallis potatoes are reported to be comparatively scarce. There is but little change in meats. Pork is easier, particularly in heavy, a considerable quantity of which has come in and which is not easily saleable, except at a figure as low as 5½c. A good deal of veal is arriving. Turkeys are scarce. Spring lamb, which a week ago was quoted at a range of \$3.50 to \$5.00 has now \$4.50 for a maximum.
