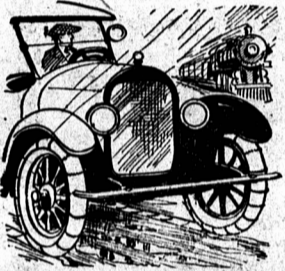

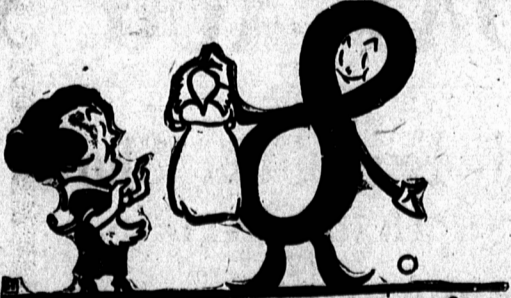

REV. W D WILSON WILL REMAIN.

FREDERICTON, July 26.—Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector under the prohibition act, will not accept the position recently offered as of general secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada.

At a meeting of the N.B. Temperance Alliance executive was held at St. John and the matter of Mr. Wilson's future was discussed. The Alliance have been supplementing the salary of \$2,100 and expenses, which is paid the chief inspector by the government, and it is understood, that in order to retain his services they have increased the amount by which they supplemented his provincial salary so that his total income will now probably be about \$3,000. It is expected that the next move by the Temperance Alliance will be a demand upon the government for improved conditions for the administration of the prohibition act enforcement.
