Hugh Cummiskey Was Dismissed

Hugh Cummiskey, Tarantum, charged with "obstructing a peace officer in the execution of his duty," came up for trial before Magistrate Shaw Tuesday afternoon and was dismissed, the Magistrate deciding that in his opinion there was no merit in the case for the prosecution.

The evidence showed that officers Leo Bradley, John J. McIntyre and Alvin Shaw went down to Cummiskey's on March 10th last for the purpose of searching, either for smuggled liquor, moonshine or a still and apparatus for making same. When they arrived the defendant was upstairs in the north west corner of the house being further away from the porch where these officers sought entrance. The defendant's daughter was in the porch when the officers shouted to her that they wanted admission. She said she would call her father. In the meantime a dog which was running around outside was shot at by one of the officers; the dog ran away yelping. A bull dog belonging to the defendant was chained up to the porch, and a couple of shots were fired at this animal. It appears that Mr. Cummiskey having heard the noise hurried downstairs and by the time he arrived at the lower hall the officers had gained admission by tearing off the outside porch door. An altercation then took place between the officers and the defendant, which ended in his being thrown on the floor and handcuffed. In this condition Mr. Cummiskey was brought to the city. His wrist had swollen in the meantime and considerable difficulty was experienced in getting the handcuff removed. He was then brought before Magistrate Shaw and a charge laid against him for "obstructing a peace officer in the execution of his duty."

The legislation had been brought down at the earliest possible moment. The speaker did not care if the house remained in session a week.

Dr. MacDonald said that the Premier, if he thought that conditions were getting better, he was living in a fool's paradise. The bootleggers and moonshiners were getting cuter, that was all. Prohibitionists had just one commandment: "Thou shalt not drink rum." It was a law which could never be enforced. I am going to judge the sincerity of the prohibitionists by the number of prescriptions that they allow the physicians. The fact is, Mr. Leader that you want the blood money.

Dr. MacMillan: Mr. Speaker there seems to be some doubt whether or not the Premier promised a special session.

(Premier Saunders rose to say that he had never promised a special session.)

At the same time the government knew this was to be the most important act of the session. The Premier says it was ready March 20th. The members on the other side of the house have had it for over a month. There is a rumour that it was to be introduced last Friday—Friday the 13th. But that would never do!

The original statement was that only one prisoner was released from jail. Now they are attempting to qualify this statement by trying to explain what a pardon is. And even now your statement is not correct. There have been more than that, even as many as three in one day. Will the Premier say that the Governor ever consulted him about releasing a prisoner?

Premier Saunders: Yes, I will.

Dr. MacMillan: What was said?

Premier Saunders: That's my business.

Dr. MacMillan: It is a terrible thing that 70 were released under the Stewart Government. How many will be released under the government at that rate?

A Voice: One hundred and fifty.

But no government is responsible for these pardons. They are the prerogative of the crown. There is one reason why there were more pardons at one time—it is that they were first offenders. And of course, when they came up the second or third time, they are not likely to be pardoned.

The Governor will exercise his prerogative so long as he thinks he is acting wisely and under the government at that rate?

Dr. MacMillan: He is getting into difficulties perhaps he may wish to consult his advisers.

Don't try to put it over the house and over the government that you can get the governor to change his mind. They aren't satisfied till they make the blunder in etiquette of going down to the governor and trying to dictate to him what he shall do.

Prohibition offenders were released under the Stewart Government, under the present government, and under this government. And they will be under every government. What is the purpose of trying to make political capital out of it? The medical men have gone to the government and tried to get the onus of the Prohibition act taken from them. What is the answer? Nothing!

If you think the medical profession of this province is going to be in the past you will find out your mistake. We have been accused of making money out of the act. We don't want to have anything to do with the act—we don't want to be made the goats under the act.

If you're going to put alcohol in the class of a medicine, what right has the government or its agent the commission to say how much alcohol the government has a right to prescribe. If you are going to make this a medicine, change all the bottles to six ounces, eight ounces and so on, and put it in the drug stores where the other medicines are.

You say conditions are better. I have seen more people treated in the last four months for alcoholism than ever before. And that is how I judge.

The way you people and the temperance people judge it is by the number of prescriptions that go through the vendor's store. They never take account of the bootleggers and what they sell. This is the dry season—and the bootleggers' supplies are getting low, for they can't get so much from the vendors. And they are going to make the act more workable. How do they propose to do it?

Mr. MacPhee: By making the officers do their duty.

Dr. MacMillan: I would like to have the Premier answer that. I would like to have a definition of that "more workable" business. And one of the important things is to settle the Doctor's prescriptions. I don't believe you are agreed on the numbers your selves. Better not cut down the Doctor's prescriptions too much. I believe the Minister of Agriculture is afraid that if you cut down the scripts too much the people may want Government Control.

The class that this act is based on are those who, if they can't get a script, won't go to a bootlegger.

In the days of the Bell Government our Hon. Friend the Premier stated that the government had no

In framing legislation. He said that if Dr. MacMillan tried to prescribe as much more as he liked he would soon find where he got off—in the penitentiary. It was his opinion that it was the duty of the government to see that those in need of liquor for medicine should get it, and that those who wished to get it for beverage purposes should be prevented from having it. He would end his speech by saying that the government might have taken the opposition into their confidence sooner only they knew they would oppose this legislation was in the interests of the Liberal party.

After thus admitting that the legislation was in the interests of the Liberal party he said that the interests of the Liberal party were synonymous with the best interests of the country.

(At 1 p. m. the House adjourned.)
