Noted Canadian Horseman Dies

TORONTO, June 15—(CP)—One of Canada's outstanding horsemen, Harry Giddings, died today. To stablehands and race-horse owners alike it felt like a personal loss.

The heavy-set, jovial trackman saddled more King's Plate winners—eight—than any other man in the history of the blue-ribbon event of Canadian racing. But more than that, he was a true horseman.

An owner, trainer and breeder, Harry had planned to retire this fall, to sell his home and breeding farm at Oakville, 20 miles west of Toronto, and live in California. His heart hadn't been too good and he suffered an attack last spring.
