## RANGERS BLANK DETROIT CHAMPIONS 1-0

### Kerr Brilliant In Nets As Manhattan Marvels Take Cup Series Lead

DETROIT, April 11—New York's Rangers advanced to just a game away from Stanley Cup custody tonight, defeating the champion Detroit Red Wings 1-0 before 13,735 customers as Davie Kerr returned to his mastery of the nets.

Neil Colville's short drive on a rebound as Detroit defenseman Johnny Gallagher was in the penalty box for tripping, provided the victory margin for the third game of the five-game cup series. The goal was scored just 23 seconds after the second period started.

The Red Wings and Rangers battled at high spirit, drawing eleven penalties in the roughness of play.

Ebbie Goodfellow of Detroit and Babe Pratt of New York produced the fistie highlight, drawing five minute penalties in the third period after swapping punches lustily.

#### FOURTH PLAYOFF SHOOTOUT

Kerr, who scored his fourth shutout in seven play off games, was the New York star. Jumping about in the nets he stopped drive after drive in the late stages of the game as the Red Wings put on the power with five man rushes in an attempt to tie the score.

Because of the many penalties, however, there were frequent moments when five-man rushes were impossible.

Pratt, in addition to his major penalty for the Goodfellow fight was in the box on two other occasions. Once he tangled with Moose Bruneteau a few seconds after Bruneteau and Joe Cooper left the penalty box for a bit of high sticking in the second period. Less than half a minute after he completed serving his five minutes in the third he battled with Herb Lewis on the right boards and both were banished.

#### COSTLY PENALTY

Gallagher's tripping of Ott Heller opened the way for the Ranger goal. On a face-off in the Detroit corner, Cooper got the puck to Pratt at the blue line, who fired a long drive that Cooper deflected slightly. Goalie Earl Robertson stopped the puck but Neil Colville was in on the rebound to hit the open net.

Heller and Alex Shibicky, both with brain concussions suffered Thursday when Detroit evened the series, played tonight with special

head guards, but Shibicky was on the ice only at infrequent intervals. The teams resume the series here Tuesday with the Rangers needing only one victory to take the Stanley Cup from the Red Wings.

### Copper Cliff Juniors Rally For Victory

TORONTO, April 11—Emerging from darkest shadows of defeat to brilliant triumph, Copper Cliff Redmen today held the edge in a titanic struggle for Dominion Junior Hockey supremacy. Never in the history of Memorial Cup play has a team rallied as did Redmen to down Winnipeg Monarchs here Saturday night.

Three goals down with but two minutes and 21 seconds of play remaining in the third period, the big nickel belt club rose to great heights to force the game into overtime. Then while his team was short-handed in the extra session, Red Hamill broke from a Winnipeg gang attack to give Redmen a 4-3 win.

"Goat" of Copper Cliff's sparkling outburst was Alf Pike, clever playmaker of Monarchs' first line. He was penalized for tripping Roy Heximer with a minute and a half to go in regulation time. A penalty shot was allowed and Heximer scored and while Pike was still off the ice Pat McReavy tied the count.

Seemingly a better balanced club than the easterners, Monarchs appeared certain of victory as they outlasted Redmen for 35 minutes. But when Heximer took Walter Zuke's pass to give Redmen their first goal, there was no stopping the Red team which sent wave after wave of attacks into Monarchs' territory.
